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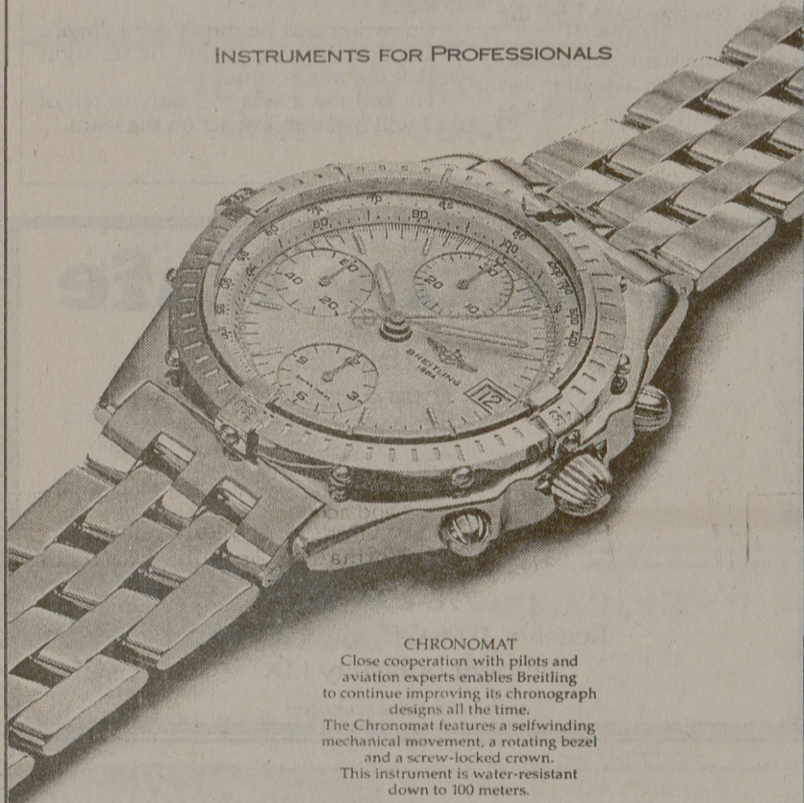
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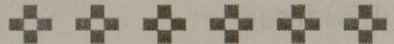

remembered far longer than the fantastic finish. Several Tech fans, displeased with their sudden, unexpected loss attempted to confront A&M players and coaches as the Aggies ran off the court towards the visitors' locker room. Pushing and shoving followed, with Joe Wilbert throwing the "Punch Heard 'Round the Nation" that leveled one of the Tech interlopers.

Back at G. Rollie White that same night, the Lady Aggies stunned Tech by scoring the last six points of the game to take a 67-64 win that former coach Lynn Hickey called the biggest of her career.

The men's team arrived back from Lubbock during the second half, and stood with the rest of the season-high crowd of 3,102 for the remainder of the game.

When the final buzzer sounded, and the fans stormed the court, Chuck Henderson performed his best moves of the day by dodging through the crowd to find sophomore point guard Lisa Branch, who led the Aggies with 19 points, and lofting her high up on his

shoulder in celebration.

The women's team appeared on the brink of domination, starting four sophomores for most of the season. Point guard Lisa Branch was named SWC women's player of the year, while sophomore post players Martha McClelland and Kelly Cerny became a punishing 1-2 punch inside.

The men's team said good-bye this season to quite simply the greatest guard A&M has ever known in David Edwards. Edwards enjoyed a tremendous season, and could be playing in the NBA come November. Also emerging big-time for A&M was Wilbert, originally from Bryan. Wilbert gave the Aggies a legitimate inside game to complement the outside shooting of Edwards, Henderson and company. Wilbert was slowed down the stretch by an injury above his eye, but regained his top form in the Aggies two victories in the SWC Tournament.

Both Aggie teams wound up finishing second in the conference, but had players who enjoyed banner seasons, and both were invited to post-season action.

The men garnered a bid to the NIT tournament, and loss a heart-breaking

overtime loss at the University of New Orleans. The women one-upped the men however, gaining a 13th seed in the NCAA tournament. In their first game, they knocked off Florida, the No. 4 seed in their region, then advanced to the Sweet 16, the highest seed ever to do so, by knocking off San Diego State at home. Unfortunately, the Lady Aggies ran into a powerful Purdue team in California. The Lady Aggies ended up ranked 19th in the final USA Today/CNN poll.

Early February means baseball in college towns, and the boys of Olsen Field appeared geared up for another championship run when they opened their season ranked as high as third nationally. The team ran off nine consecutive victories to start the year, including a three-game sweep at perennial power Arizona.

But then the wheels came off the wagon. The Aggies started off the Southwest Conference season by being swept by rival Texas, then again at Rice. Suddenly, the College World Series looked like a dream, and a more immediate goal became making the SWC tournament, which the Aggies were scheduled to host in mid-May.

The team did not pick up its first conference win until the first weekend in April against the University of Houston. The Aggies, however, ended the SWC season with a lethargic 6-12 record.

The pitching staff was the source of many of the team's woes, as the team lost two aces in Jeff Granger and Kelly Wunsch to the major league draft. Also gone from the team was heavy hitter Brian Thomas, whose homerun bat could not be replaced. The pitching staff will again have to start patching itself again next year, as it is expected that underclassmen pitchers Trey Moore and Chris Clemons will declare their eligibility for the upcoming draft.

While the men ballplayers struggled, their female softball counterparts more than picked up the slack. Playing in their new ballpark, the team, currently ranked 11th in the country, has been dominating the whole season as they make a bid for the World Series. The team has been led by All-American Jennifer McFalls, who recently won the Female Athlete of the Year award at the women's athletic banquet, and Kim Gonzalez, who has already racked up nearly 30 wins this year.

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
