### Disney's latest packs spectacular sequences, comedy into morality play

Playing at Hollywood U.S.A It's got everything Disney's

sequences can accomplish. For comedy, the G-rated film is similar to "Aladdin," but its inside humor appeals to all audiences more than Robin William's genie jokes in "Aladdin" did.

is certainly a major leaguestrike out, it may be good for some minor league entertain ment.


