

Bulgaria, Italy make quarterfinals

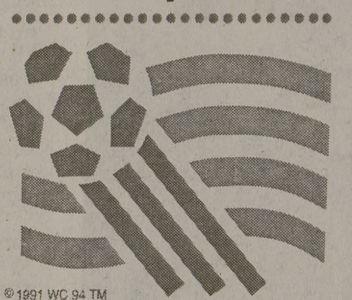
Italians win in overtime; Bulgaria needs penalty kicks for win

UNDATED (AP) — Ninety minutes weren't enough to decide either World Cup second-round game on Tuesday. Italian superstar Roberto Baggio scored in the 89th minute to lift his team into a tie, then connected on a penalty kick in the 102nd minute, giving Italy a 2-1 overtime victory against Nigeria. Mexico and Bulgaria needed even more time to settle their match, with Bulgaria winning 3-1 on penalty kicks after a 1-1 tie.

"We have recovered the real Roberto Baggio, the player we always wanted to have on our team," Italian soccer chief Antonio Matarrese said after his team rallied despite playing down a man for 44 minutes.

"I'd like to kiss the entire na-

tion of Bulgaria," goalie Borislav Mihaylov said after stopping

three shots in the penalty kick shootout. "This is the happiest I have been in my life."

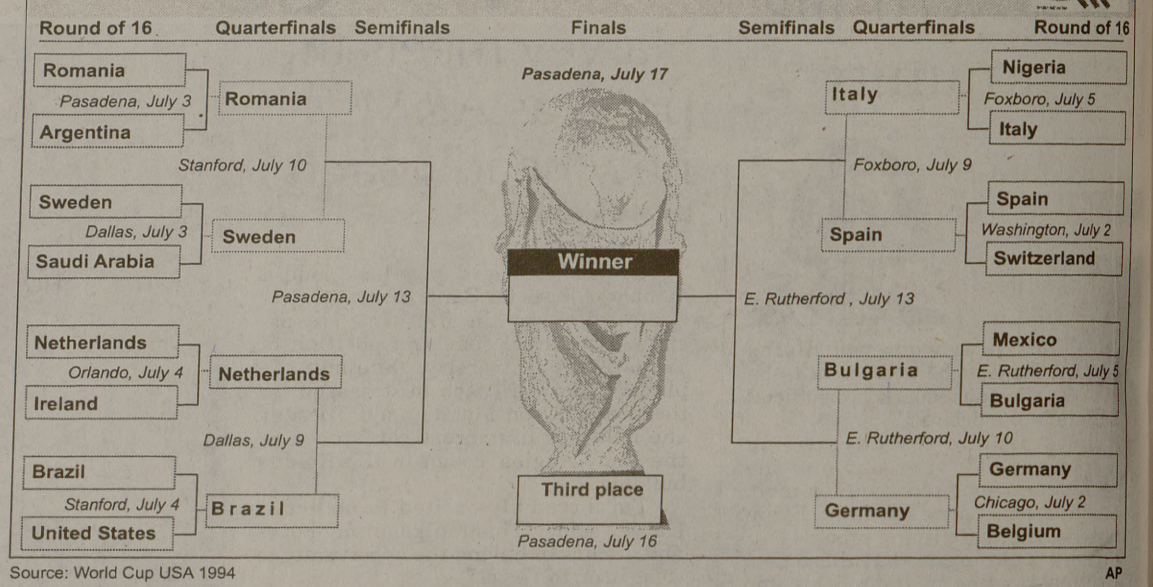
Italy plays Spain at Foxboro Stadium in the quarterfinals on Saturday. Bulgaria takes on defending champion Germany on Sunday at Giants Stadium.

Also on Saturday, Brazil meets the Netherlands at Dallas and Romania faces Sweden at Stanford, Calif.

"We already were at the airport, we were mentally prepared to return home," Baggio, the 1993 player of the year, said. "I took them all down from the plane."

Scoreless for eight games, Baggio redeemed himself by converting a pass from Roberto Mussi with a brilliant kick to the left corner of the net.

Harnisch tames Cards; Brown beats Indians

Houston 3, St. Louis 1

Rangers 4, Indians 3

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Pete Harnisch and two relievers combined on a four-hitter, and Steve Finley had a home run and two RBIs as Houston beat the St. Louis Cardinals 3-1 Tuesday night.

Craig Biggio led off the game with his fifth home run for the Astros.

Harnisch (4-4) allowed only a fluke run in the second inning.

Harnisch gave up a run on four hits with three strikeouts and a walk in six innings.

Todd Jones pitched two hitless innings and John Hudek pitched the ninth for his 13th save as three Astros pitchers combined on a four-hitter.

Cardinals starter Vicente Palacios (1-7) allowed three runs on six hits, with five strikeouts and two walks.

Finley led off the fourth with his ninth home run, tying his career high.

Houston added a run in the sixth when Harnisch doubled and scored on Finley's sacrifice.

ARLINGTON, Texas (AP) — Kevin Brown, who spent the morning with his ailing father in Georgia, tied a career high with 10 strikeouts Tuesday night and pitched the Texas Rangers past the Cleveland Indians 4-3.

Brown left the team Monday to be with his father, Gerald, who had a heart attack at home.

There were doubts that Brown would make it back for his start, but he took an afternoon flight to Texas to take his regular turn in the rotation.

Brown (6-8) gave up seven hits and walked one in his second complete game of the season.

Texas overcame three errors by third baseman Dean Palmer.

The first five Rangers in the sixth inning singled off Mark Clark (9-3), who was 7-1 in his previous 10 starts.

Palmer singled home a run and Rusty Greer's RBI single broke a 3-3 tie.

Rockets fire mascot Turbo, 10 others

HOUSTON (AP) — Less than two weeks after winning the NBA championship, the Houston Rockets on Tuesday fired 11 front-office employees, including popular high-flying mascot Turbo.

Jerry Burrell, the former All-America gymnast who played both mascots Turbo and Booster during Rockets home games, was terminated, along with media information director Jay Goldberg, ticket operations director Jeff Gaines and eight others.

John Thomas, Rockets vice president of business operations, said the team had longstanding plans to evaluate the business staff when the season was over.

"This is an internal matter that does not affect the basketball team or operation," Thomas said. "Beyond that, I'm not going to comment. Philosophy and direction should be discussed at a different time when it's not connected by some misperception."

The firings also included an assistant media information director, the director of merchandising and employees in tickets, sales and community relations.

Ticket manager Peggy Hartensteiner also resigned.

Burrell, who as the masked Turbo performed acrobatic slam dunks during timeouts, said it would be inappropriate for him to discuss the reasons he was given for his firing.

"Anything I would say right now would do no good," he said.

After the firings, fewer than five front-office employees remain from before owner Leslie Alexander bought the team last July.

About 21 employees have been fired or left the team since then.

Alexander declined comment on the latest firings when reached at his home in Boca Raton, Fla., by The Houston Post.
