A&M receives \$1.3 million Defense Department awards federal grant

for environmental engineering scholarships

The United States Department of Defense has awarded Texas A&M University a \$1.3 million federal grant to provide environmental engineering students with scholarships and fellowships.

U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm said approximately \$437,500 of the \$1.3 million will be used for scholarships and fellowships for environ-

mental engineering students. The remaining \$836,375 will go to develop a demonstration project establishing environmental training courses to assist displaced defense industry workers.

'I am delighted that Texas A&M University has been chosen to play a key role in this year's Department of Defense Environmental Scholarship, Fellowship and Grant Programs,"

Dr. Bill Bachelor, Texas A&M civil engineering professor, said the grant program will benefit A&M students while training individuals who have lost their job in the defense industry.

"Basically, the Department of Defense plans to solve two problems at once," Bachelor said.

He said there are a number of defense installations with environmental problems that need to be solved before they can move ahead. Second, with defense cutbacks, many defense workers

are losing their jobs.

The Department of Defense was looking for a way to combine a program that would provide new skills for unemployed workers, while bringing more environ-

department to solve the environmental problems, he said.

"This a program that will offer support for the students and valuable training for those in need," Bachelor said.

He said that the fellowship program would allow many A&M students to receive money from the defense department by agreeing to work with the department after graduating from college.

Gramm said a total of \$20 million in the Defense Environmental Scholarship, Fellowship and Grant Program funds were awarded to 16 colleges and universities nationwide.


