The juniors, who were named Monday morning, were selected by the 72 current senior members

To be eligible for membership, a junior must have a 2.3 cumulative grade point ratio and be in good discipline standing with the Corps and the University.

Brian Taylor, commanding officer of the Ross Volunteers, said that during the selection process, the seniors consider how well the juniors represent the qualities of Lawrence Sullivan Ross, the group's namesake.

"We're concerned with the values that Lawrence Sullivan Ross stood for," Taylor said, "soldier, statesman, knightly gentle-

Tony DiCuffa, a senior member of the Ross Volunteers, said he believes the basis of selection is essentially the same as it was in 1887, the first year the Ross Volunteers were formed.
