the leaders who were sitting beside him and in the audience.

"When I look out here at the dedicated leaders from my administration, I see... well, I see half the field for the 1996 cam-paign," Bush said. "This library and everything it represents would not have been possible without these people.'

Some of his special guests were Brian Mulroney, former Canadian prime minister; George W. Bush, governor-elect of Texas; Lamar Alexander, former secretary of education; Andrew Card, former secretary of transportation; Edward Derwinski, former secretary of veterans' affairs; Lawrence Eagleburger, former secretary of state; Lynn Martin, former secretary of labor; Brent Scowcroft, former national security advisor; Louis Sullivan, former secretary of health and human services; and John Sununu, former chief of staff.

The Bushes, A&M officials and former members of Bush's administration then participated in the actual breaking of ground for the library.

After the ceremony, the Bushes attended a luncheon at the MSC with six hundred invited guests, where Bush was presented with a hardhat as a remembrance of the groundbreaking events.

The Presidential Library Center will include the library and museum, the Center for Presidential Studies, the Center for In-ternational Studies, the George Bush School of Government and Public Service and several academic departments.

Construction will begin soon on the \$82 million project with completion set for 1997

The Bush Library will be the 10th presidential library operated by the National Archives.

Bush graduated from Phillips Academy in 1942 and served as a fighter pilot in World War II. When commissioned, he was the youngest pilot in the U.S. Navy.

After the war, he graduated from Yale University with a degree in economics. He moved to Texas and co-founded Zapata Offshore Co. in 1953.

He represented Texas' 7th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives from 1966 to 1970. He was director of the Central Intelligence Agency in 1976. After serving eight years as Ronald Reagan's vice president, Bush was elected president in 1988 and served until 1993.

He and his wife Barbara now live in Houston.




