Blue Jays looking for replacements

NEW YORK (AP) — The ads are showing up in the sports section, although maybe they should be in the "Help Wanted" column.

"Could you make it in the Major Leagues?" read the bold-typed notices appearing in several Southern newspapers this week.

They're being placed by the Toronto Blue Jays, who, like every other team in the majors, are scrambling to find players to replace striking major leaguers.

The Blue Jays are holding a tryout camp for potential replacements this Saturday at their spring training home in Dunedin, Fla. Toronto is trying to attract as many players as possible to the workout, and trying different ways to do it.

The team is putting the ads in newspapers in eight cities, including Atlanta and Knoxville, Tenn. On Monday, the advertisement appeared on page three of the sports sections of The News &

Observer in Raleigh, N.C., and The Birmingham News in Alabama.

The Blue Jays are looking "to discover new baseball talent," said the ads, both two columns wide and five inches deep. According to the News & Observer's rates, that space would cost about

four-year college and have eligibility remaining.

The advertisement lists the phone number of the team's scouting department in Dunedin and is signed "The Toronto Blue Jays."

"We've gotten quite a few phone calls already," Blue Jays spokesman Howard Starkman said Monday night.

He said that although most of the one-time ads were being placed in newspapers around Florida and Georgia, some would run for a day in North Carolina.

"There are a lot of former players in that area, and we want to let as many of them know about this as possible," he said.

The Blue Jays had scheduled a pair of tryouts for California last weekend, but they were postponed because of heavy rains. The Blue Jays advertised those camps in about 10 newspapers in California.

FLOYD ENDZONE SHOW DEEMED EXCESSIVE BY COACH SEIFERT

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — While Deion Sanders is the dance leader of the San Francisco 49ers defense, fullback William Floyd provides the swagger on offense.

Floyd is a rookie who signs autographs "Bar None," a nickname he adopted after his agent declared during negotiations that he would be the best fullback in football "bar none." And Floyd, like Sanders a Florida State product, is living up to the hype.

He has scored four touchdowns in the playoffs, and his blocking has been one of the reasons quarterback Steve Young has been sacked only once in two postseason games.

"He can block an end, he's a good receiver and he's a power runner," Young said. "To me, he's the consummate fullback. When we lost Tom Rathman, we got a rookie who doesn't play like a

rookie."

Marc Logan took over as the 49ers' starting fullback when Rathman went to the Los Angeles Raiders before the season, but lasted only five games in that role. Floyd got his first start at Detroit, where he helped rally San Francisco from a 14-0 deficit, and has been the starter since.

Floyd scored a pair of touchdowns in that Detroit game, which the 49ers won 27-21 to start a 10-game winning streak, and provided a spark for a team doubting itself after a 40-8 loss the previous week to Philadelphia.

He was criticized by coach George Seifert for excessive end zone celebrations following those touchdowns, but Seifert and the rest of the 49ers eventually have fed off those outbursts.

"I couldn't change myself, and I told coach Seifert that," Floyd said. "He really respects me for that, for being myself. The Detroit week, everybody was over my back about me celebrating and all different things. Then as soon as Deion and the rest of the guys got into the act,

"It's not a negative thing at all. I'm not poking fun at anybody. I'm not trying to taunt anybody."

zone fracas by body-slaming Bears defensive end Alonzo Spellman, further erasing the 49ers' long-standing image as a finesse team.

And in last Sunday's NFC championship game, Floyd ran toward the Dallas bench during pregame introductions to yell at the Cowboys.

"I think emotion might be the best thing I can bring to this offense now," he said. "I don't think I've ever been humbled, but we'll see."

The only person who seems not completely pleased by this intensity is his mother, Sylvia, who watches her son on television from Jacksonville, Fla.

"I was talking to my mom the other day," Floyd said. "And she asked, 'Why do you always look so serious?'"

Rams relocating to St. Louis

Will play in new \$260 million dome, \$15 million practice facility

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Seven years ago, St. Louis lost a bad NFL team. On Tuesday, the city got one back.

The Los Angeles Rams, 4-12 in 1994, made it official: They're leaving Southern California for St. Louis.

"I'm overwhelmed," Rams owner Georgia Frontiere said at a news conference to announce the move and the addition of Columbia, Mo., businessman Stan Kroenke as minority owner.

"I don't think I've been this happy since the last game we won."

St. Louis is certainly hoping for better things this time.

After enduring the pratfalls of Bill Bidwill's Cardinals for 28 seasons and zero playoff victories, they get a team that historically has been a contender but that hasn't fielded a winner in five seasons. In 1993, they were 5-11.

The year before they were 6-10.

The cost for this also-ran was steep. St. Louis beat out Baltimore and a group from Anaheim, Calif., called "Save the Rams" because of a deal that could yield \$20 million in annual profits for the Rams.

For starters, the Rams will get a new \$260 million domed stadium, deemed the "most spectacular stadium on the planet Earth" by St. Louis County Executive Buzz Westfall.

They'll get to choose from among three sites for a \$15 million practice facility and their

annual lease is only \$250,000.

St. Louis also is retiring the Rams' \$30 million debt to Anaheim and paying \$15 million in assorted relocation fees.

"They always say money is a means to an end," Frontiere said. "This time, money is a means to a beginning."

Now there's so much money, the arrangement may have the appearance of a modern-day holdup.

Former Missouri Sen. Thomas Eagleton, who led the negotiations for the St. Louis civic group FANS Inc., thinks not.

"It's expensive to get a team," Eagleton said. "No team is going to say, 'Here we are,' for free."

As a cost analysis, Eagleton said Chicago is spending \$32 million to hold the Democratic National Convention in 1996 for one week, but St. Louis will be getting the Rams for at least 30 years — the length of the lease.

NASCAR comes to Dallas

FORT WORTH (AP) — The primary design consultant to the Indianapolis Motor Speedway has been hired to work on a proposed speedway for Dallas' west side.

The firm of Fink, Roberts & Petrie has already begun design work for the 1.5-mile track planned by Waco racing magnate Billy Meyer, said William Beuck, president of Morning Park Inc.

Morning Park Inc. owns the proposed site and has joined Meyer Motorsports in developing the multimillion-dollar racetrack.

Beuck said conceptual drawings are underway, but it's too early to set a specific timetable for the work.

"We're really in the first phase of a development project," he said.

Fink, Roberts & Petrie is a firm noted for its longtime consultation with the Indianapolis Motor Speedway.

Meyer announced his track plans shortly before North Carolina racing magnate Bruton Smith announced plans to build a \$75 million auto speedway for NASCAR events in the Dallas-Fort Worth area.
