Stars, Capitals make trade

Dallas swaps captain for all-star defenseman.

ODENTON, Md. (AP) — The Washington Capitals solved two problems Wednesday by trading away a pair of former NHL All-Stars, defenseman Kevin Hatcher and goaltender Don Beaupre. Hatcher, who refused to sign with Washington in part because he felt underappreciated by fans and management, was sent to the Dallas Stars for defenseman Mark Tinordi and college defenseman Rick Mrozik. Beaupre, 33, was dealt to the Ottawa Senators for a fifth-round pick in the 1995 entry draft. The move clears the way for some of the Capitals' younger goalies, most notably Rick Tabaracci and Olaf Kolzig, to get some significant playing time. Tinordi was the Stars' team captain in each of the past three seasons and was selected to play in the 1992 All-Star Game. Mrozik, the Stars' sixth-round pick in the 1993 draft, has yet to play in the NHL.

Beaupre was the Capitals' main man in the net since being acquired in a trade with Minnesota in 1988. The 14-year veteran has a lifetime record of 254-221-72 in 585 games, including five straight 20-win seasons, and is Washington's all-time leader in games (269), wins (128) and shutouts (12). But the two-time All-Star became a victim of the Capitals' desire to, as Poile put it, "go in a different direction." "There's no question that Don Beaupre was a safety net for us. He's been a very good goaltender at this level, and still is," Poile said. "I admit that it's a risk to go to two goaltenders that have never been No. 1 in the NHL, but we're hoping some of these younger goalies can carry us to higher heights." Tabaracci, 26, has a 31-42-9

Kolzig, the Capitals expect long-term contributions from young goalies Byron Dafoe and Jim Carey. "We feel we have as good a young goaltending corps as anyone in the NHL," Poile declared. Tinordi, 28, was the Stars' captain in each of the past three seasons. He had 24 points in 61 games with Dallas last season before breaking his leg and missing the final 23 regular-season games as well as the playoffs. He only has 144 points in 399 career games, but the Capitals didn't get him because of his offensive numbers. "I really believe that Mark Tinordi fit our team to a T," Poile said. "I think we have certainly enough talent in the lineup, and with Tinordi we've added the grit and competitiveness you need to win in the regular season and especially in the playoffs." Said Schoenfeld: "We're getting a real good hockey player here. He's an example of what hard work and determination can accomplish." Hatcher has played in 685 NHL games since being picked first by Washington and 17th overall in the 1984 entry draft. A three-time All-Star, his finest season came in 1992-93, when he had 34 goals and 45 assists for a career-high 79 points. Prior to the start of the regular season, Poile held a news conference to announce that Hatcher would never again play for the Capitals, noting, "He said he's not happy here and not getting the proper support and appreciation. He wants to go in a new direction."

Of course, with Beaupre in the net, Kolzig never got much of a shot. 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Jerry Jones says juniors belong in Senior Bowl

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — How does the Junior & Senior Bowl sound? Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones says underclassmen entering the NFL are working with a handicap since they can't participate in the Senior Bowl Saturday at Ladd Stadium. Jones said he does not support the practice of players giving up college eligibility to enter the draft. But, since they do it every year, Jones said underclassmen should get to play in the game. "To the extent that underclassmen are going to be in the draft, it would be good for them to be able to play in games such as this one," Jones said at practice Tuesday. Jones and Cowboys coach Barry Switzer are among some 350 NFL scouts and coaches in

MOBILE for the game, which is a showcase for players hoping to make it to the pro ranks. While the game itself is important, scores of scouts also attend the practice sessions. This year, much of the attention is being given to a trio of quarterbacks. Alabama's Jay Barker, Penn State's Kerry Collins and Steve McNair of Alcorn State are trying to show the NFL why they were considered three of the nation's top collegiate quarterbacks. Former Crimson Tide coach Ray Perkins, now offensive coordinator for the New England Patriots, said this year's game has a good pedigree of quarterbacks. "For these players to succeed in the National Football League, they have to perform with topnotch excellence for whatever team they're drafted by," he said.

Feud begins over scabs' salaries

NEW YORK (AP) — Baseball owners said Wednesday they will return to the bargaining table only when asked by mediator W.J. Utery, and they accused the union of threatening to take money away from possible replacement players. On Tuesday, union head Donald Fehr accused acting commissioner Bud Selig of lying to members of Congress by saying the union is refusing to resume negotiations. Selig, claiming Fehr was relying on "second-hand information," said what he told congressmen was that the union hadn't seriously bargained. "I and other club owners told members of Congress that the strike will be resolved only when both parties return to the

bargaining table and address the fundamental issue of labor costs," Selig wrote in a letter to Fehr that was made public. "If Bud would actually come to negotiations, he might know what was actually going on. He doesn't," Fehr countered in a telephone interview. "I notice he emphatically does not deny that it was them who broke off negotiations, withdrew all their proposals and imposed their salary cap." Management's 12-member negotiating committee is to meet with Utery in Washington on Thursday. "Hopefully that meeting and his discussions with you will convince him that it would be productive to resume negotiations," Selig wrote.

Oilers add 2 new coaches

HOUSTON (AP) — Johnny Roland, who coached running backs for the New York Jets, is joining the Houston Oilers in the same capacity. Roland, whose hiring was announced Wednesday, joins former Phoenix Cardinals offensive coordinator and Minnesota Vikings receivers coach Jerry Rhome, who was hired Tuesday as Houston's offensive coordinator. Roland, 51, comes off a two-year stint with the Jets. A Corpus Christi, Texas native, Roland started his NFL coaching career at the Green Bay Packers in 1974. He established himself as one of the best running backs coaches in the league during his 10-year tenure at the Chicago Bears from 1983-1992, coaching Hall of Famer Walter Payton and Neil Anderson. Rhome, 52, filled a key vacancy on new coach Jeff Fisher's staff. The Oilers also hired Rod Perry as defensive backs coach Tuesday. Fisher said Rhome "is a players' coach, and he has a great offensive mind." "He also possesses the ability to get the most out of his players, which is a quality I was looking for," Fisher said. Rhome, a Dallas native, worked last season as receivers coach in Minnesota. Prior to that, he was offensive coordinator in Phoenix from 1990-93.

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The other things you're capable of." McGinnis poses a threat to Aggie opposition at the other end of the court as well. The 3-year letterman is second on the team in scoring at 14.4 points per game and third in rebounding, averaging 4.2 boards per contest. "He scores for us in a lot of different ways," Barone said. "He's going to get the easy baskets for us and he's shooting free throws really well this year." McGinnis' blue-collar work ethic impresses Barone the most. "To be a good defensive play-

er, you can't worry about whether a guy makes a basket on you or not," Barone said. "You have to bounce back and be resilient and McGinnis does a good job of that." "If a kid scores, he doesn't just hang his head and stop playing, he comes back and tries to cut him off the next time." McGinnis' work ethic not only molds him into a better player, but also sets an example for a few of his biggest fans. "I set a goal to get better at something each day," McGinnis said. "My three younger brothers look up to me, so I try to set an example and lay a foundation for them to learn and build on."

McGinnis envisions himself playing professional basketball one day. However, the senior journalism major is not taking anything for granted and stresses that his education is a top priority. McGinnis received several academic awards in high school and he is active with Aggies for Education. "You never know what's down the road," McGinnis said. "I want to get an education so I can have a decent job down the line." "I try to stress the importance of getting a good education to those who look up to me. Not everybody has a future in the NBA."
