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Does Bo know acting?

Former Heisman Award winner Bo Jackson retires from baseball to pursue a career in acting.

Chicago home Tuesday taking calls, fielding questions on the phone while greeting his 6-year-old back from gymnastics class.

(AP)- Bo Jackson, who turned his two-sport stardom into a hit feature of celebrity marketing, is retiring from baseball, ending one of America's great sports stories.

Bo, however, is not about to disappear. Jackson said Tuesday he is interested in becoming an actor, a real one on the big screen, not just the Bo who performed athletic feats for TV commercials.

He said of his desire to learn the stagecraft of Hollywood, "I'll never just play 'Bo Jackson'... I've been playing 'Bo Jackson' for 32 years."

Now on the William Morris agency roster, with pilots and possible movie projects in the works, he said he might play an ex-athlete, but "I want to get as far away from the sports spectrum as I can."

The end of his dazzling sports career — Heisman Trophy, baseball and NFL star — came with little fanfare. He was at his
