to be teaching them about contraceptives. Teachers are not health professionals. If teenagers truly need information about contraceptives, they should talk to a medical professional," Lee said.

She said another area of concern was that one of the textbooks encouraged the discussion of euthanasia.

Lee also questioned a specific

textbook exercise suggesting students list something they think is wrong such as stealing, and then asked when they would make an exception to their belief.

Dr. Claude Cunningham, CSISD director of secondary programs, worked in conjunction with the textbook committee and said the school board had many reasons for deciding to reject the adoption of the textbooks.

"There was community concern about some of the books' content," he said. "The board had to consid-

er that when textbooks are adopted, they must be used for seven years or more. It should be noted that many school districts have had problems adopting health textbooks recently. Personally, I have talked with administrators at a dozen other school districts with similar problems."

Cunningham said the school district has created a committee to establish an instruction policy on human sexuality that could accompany the textbooks, if they are resubmitted to the school board.

Scales said the preparation of the instruction policy is underway, and the textbook committee will meet after the school board approves the policy.

"Currently, a committee is preparing a policy on how to teach human sexuality," Scales said. "I am hopeful that the school board will approve a second recommendation of textbooks in conjunction with the instruction policy, once the policy is approved."

John Rouse, assistant superintendent for curriculum and in-

struction, said that if the school board does not approve the proposed textbooks, there are other options.

One option would be to have a textbook committee to review other health textbooks approved by the College Station school board, a waiver of approval would be submitted to the state board.

Another option would be for the CSISD to develop its own health curriculum and submit it for approval.

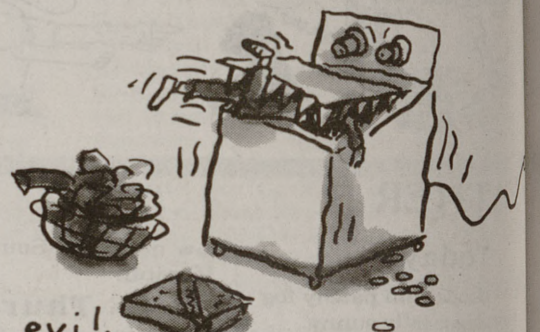

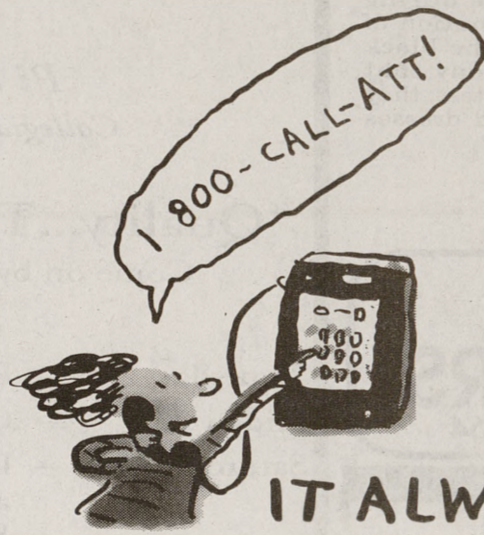
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
