at this stage and A&M is at this stage and our paths intersected." Sessoms, who is a physicist with a Ph.D. from Yale, said he was reluctant at first to entertain the possibility of working for A&M.

"I studied the University and became convinced A&M is one of the best schools in the country,"

Sessoms said. "It's really an extraordinary place. The faculty is superb and I am impressed by the quality of the students. It should be the best school in the country."

Sessoms said A&M needs to decide it wants to be the best school in the nation and be willing to work toward that goal.

"A&M needs to be networking with high schools and middle schools," Sessoms said. "Everyone should know where A&M is and it shouldn't be just about football. It needs to decide it's going to be even better

in research. It should be in the political inner circle.

Freund, who has a Ph.D. in economics from the University of Michigan, said her working personality would fit in well at A&M.

"I'm a very open, collaborative type of person," Freund said. "I have a very open official policy. I sensed after my first visit to A&M that it was a very friendly campus."

Freund said A&M needs someone who can help it work through past problems.

"The University has gone

through a period of leadership instability and of tremendous growth, and the level of focus coming through the state is coming off," Freund said. "We need somebody who knows how to make the best out of the situation you have."

Satterwhite said the job is to contact the branches of the military to secure military resources in disasters.

"The president is the one who can authorize FEMA involvement, and we're usually only called in times of major disasters," Satterwhite said. "However, due to the devastation in Oklahoma, they felt it necessary that we get involved."

The liaison team was made up of eight reservists with representatives from the Army and Air Force branches of the military, Satterwhite said.

"It was a 24 hour operation with half the team working 12 hour shifts," he said. "The other 12 hours you were on call, you would just eat, sleep and be ready for the next shift."

The team was stationed in blocks from the federal center in the downtown area, he said.

In this particular situation, Satterwhite said the team was to provide any resources necessary to the volunteer Urban Search and Rescue teams, the FBI and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms.

"If the volunteers need rain suits for 200 volunteers, for example, we would get them through military channels and have them flown in," he said. "Other examples of our duties were to locate survivors and medical experts to coordinate aerial photography over the city."

"Resources were first secured locally and then state-wide. Only when these two channels failed did we have to look for resources."

Satterwhite said he left Oklahoma Tuesday morning with a good feeling about the citizens.

"I was impressed most of all by how the community came together for the victims and their families," he said. "There was also incredible support given by the city and to the volunteers."

The Oklahoma Restaurant Association provided the volunteers with free 24-hour meals. Telephone companies gave free cellular phone service and the UPS provided shipping.

"I had never seen a community reaction like this," Satterwhite said. "I think the community provided a humanity aspect that made it possible for the volunteers to continue in their duties."

"Right now the media is focused on the crime and the victims, but I'm sure there will be more of a focus on the community's support later."

Satterwhite said the support from his family and the University made his departure easier.

"A&M was very supportive of my leaving," he said. "I had weeks in advance that I had to leave, but the Commandant's office said, 'Don't worry about it, go, we understand.'"

"My family was also very supportive and understood my situation had changed. I called them every night."

Satterwhite said quite a few A&M former students helped in Oklahoma.

Col. Don Crawford, Class of '64, and Army Lt. Col. Fred Hertzog, Class of '72, also served on the military liaison team.

"A lady with the AT&T my Aggie ring and said, 'you an Aggie? I am too, Class of '85,'" he said. "I never heard her name though."

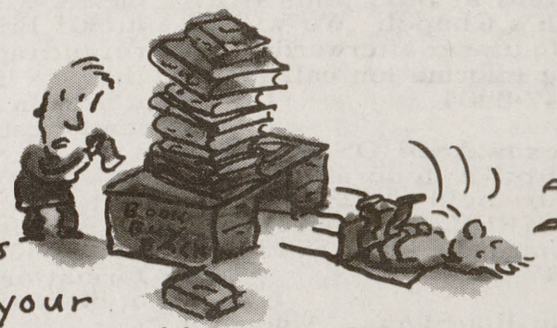
Satterwhite said the experience has left him with mixed emotions.

"It was a mixed experience," he said. "I feel outrage at the crime and the devastation and damage it caused, but compared to the loss of life, it's insignificant."

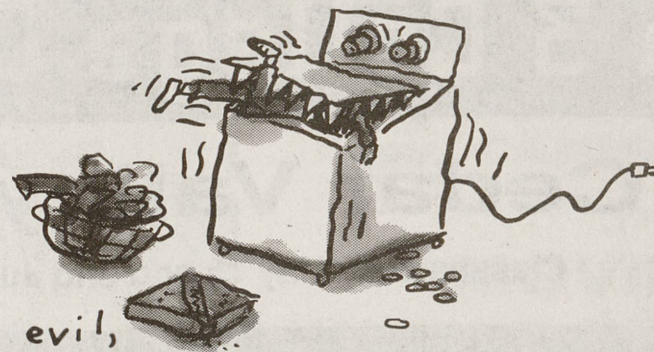
"I think when children are involved it lends a sensitivity to it that is over and above a crumbled building."

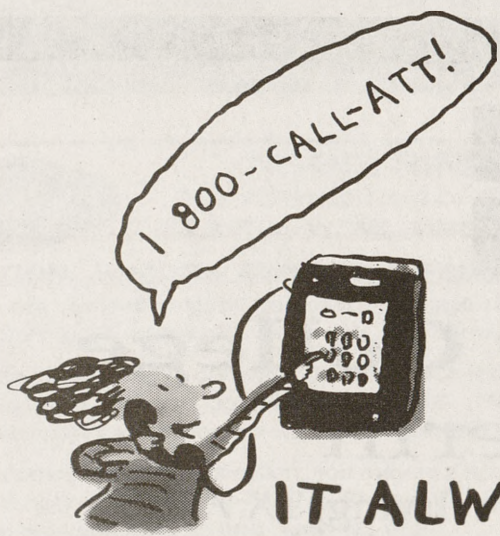
