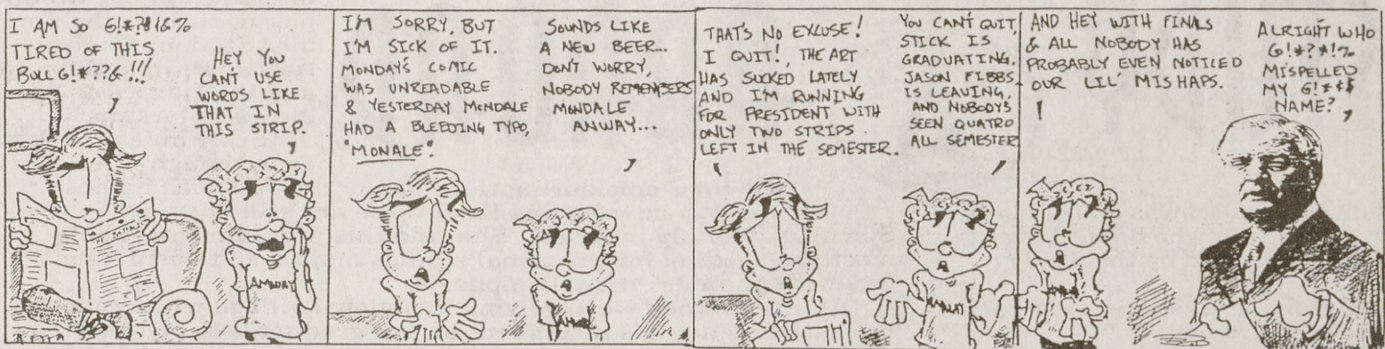

Amarillo school report five cases of active TB

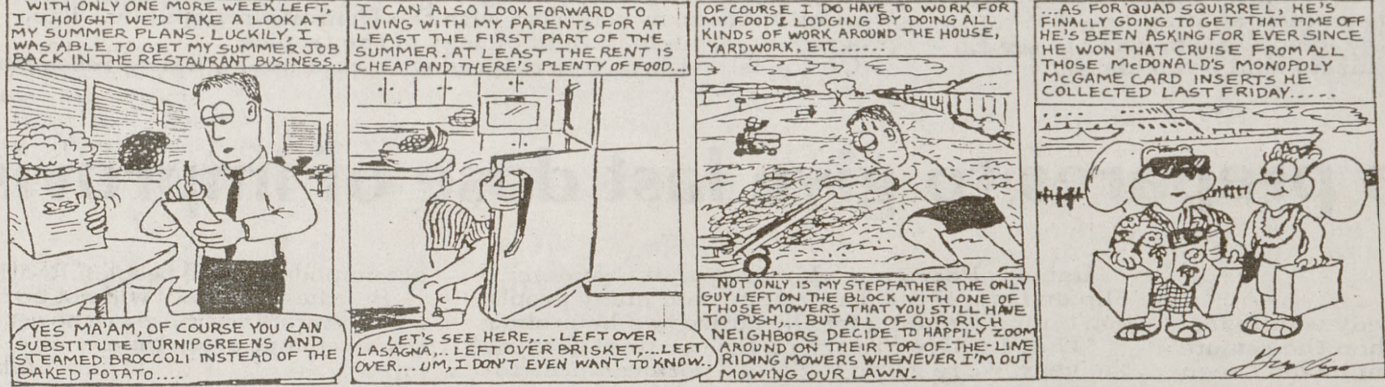
AMARILLO, Texas (AP) — Five children at two Amarillo elementary schools, four at one school alone, have been diagnosed with active tuberculosis, public health officials said Tuesday.
 The Amarillo public school tuberculosis control program found four children with active TB at Will Rogers Elementary in northeast Amarillo during an annual spring screening, said Dr. Rush Pierce, a tuberculosis specialist at North Texas Health Systems, an Amarillo hospital.
 Another child with active TB was found during screening at Glenwood Elementary School in southeast Amarillo, he said.
 "These kids are all back at school now. There probably isn't any reason to keep the home except to keep on the conservative side of things," said Karr Ingham, an Amarillo public schools spokesman.
 "They were out about two days. I don't think they missed a step," he said.
 Pierce said other children at the schools are in no danger of contracting tuberculosis from the infected children.
 Of 1,173 students tested, showed they had been exposed to tuberculosis. Follow-up examinations and chest X-rays detected active TB in the five children, said Anne Denison, a tuberculosis nurse at North Texas Health Systems, the hospital conducting the tests.
 "On Wednesday, we'll tell the rest of the student body, faculty and staff at Will Rogers Pierce said.
 The school district has a enrollment of about 30,000, including 500 at Will Rogers and 350 at Glenwood, Ingham said.
 "Even with active cases, children do not transmit tuberculosis the way adults do. It's not contagious," he said, when we see TB in a child, we know they've been recently infected by an adult. We usually find the case in the household."
 Pierce said most of the infected children already have started on preventative antibiotic therapy in their homes. School nurses will monitor five children to ensure they're taking their medication, he said.
 Also, their household friends and other possible sources have agreed to be checked for TB to learn the source of the contagion, he said. All are cooperating, he said.
 There had been no case of tuberculosis found among children in Amarillo schools since 1994, Ms. Denison said.
 "We did change our screening program to be directed toward English-as-a-second-language students," Pierce said. "Those are primarily students from immigrant families, and we figured that would target high risk populations."
 However, such a strategy might offend targeted groups in some cities, said Isabel V. nurse consultant for the State Bureau of Communicable Disease Control.
 "We recommend screening school-age children, but we don't require it," she said.

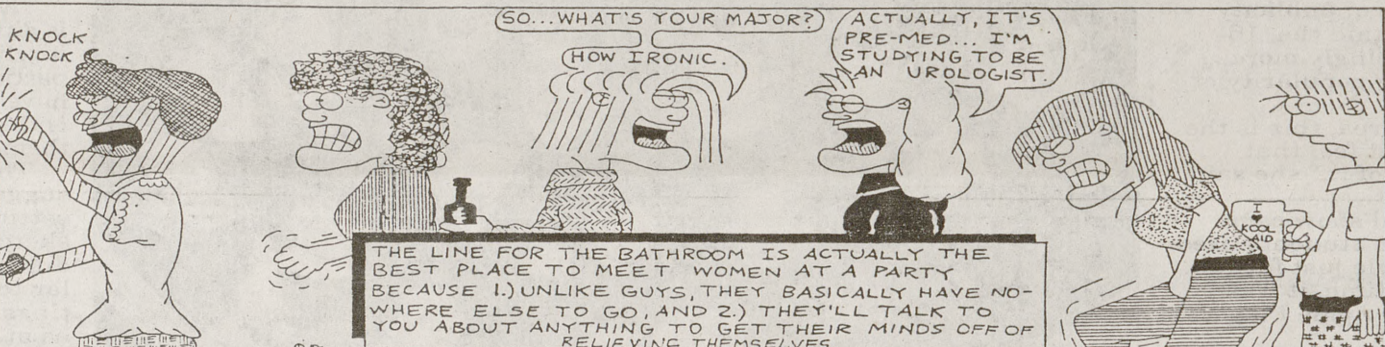
