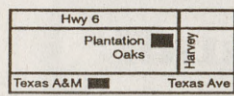

ENERGY: Improvements will decrease utility costs

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air conditioning units, called constant air volume systems, operate by heating and cooling simultaneously. The systems work like a shower faucet, blending the hot air that is produced with increasing amounts of cold air.

Darnell said these systems are extremely costly during the summer.

"When you're not in your peak cooling load, you have to put a whole lot of extra cooling into the facility to remove the heat," Darnell said. "It sounds almost silly that those systems would be designed that way."

The new systems will only produce cool air, he said.

The grant also will pay for improvements in the chilled water systems, which circulate cool water to buildings on campus. The water is used to cool the air, then send the water back to be chilled again.

Darnell said controls will be installed in the buildings so that chilled water is used only when it is needed.

Both of the projects will reduce the amount of energy needed, which will decrease utility costs.

The LoanSTAR projects are part of the University's four-year-old energy management program. Darnell said there are 11 ongoing projects with a \$12 million price tag, and when the projects are finished, the University will use 15 percent less energy.

Darnell said A&M's program was based on established programs at other universities like the University of Texas and Texas Southern University.

V.J. Von Wolske, an energy conservation engineer at UT, said the UT energy management program involves several elements of the Texas A&M program, like the air conditioning renovations.

He explained that the UT campus has reduced its energy use by 33 percent since 1986, and as the program continues to grow, the campus will use less and less energy.

Von Wolske said there must be certain factors to make any energy conservation work.

"The keys are administrative support, very good technical support and long-term commitment," Von Wolske said.

Dr. Jerry Gaston, interim vice president for finance and administration, said the administration fully supports the program.

"I think it's important for any academic institution to set an example of what is the proper use of our natural resources," Gaston said. "That has to be a high priority."

Gaston also said the University is aware of the benefits good energy management can yield. He explained that by reducing utility costs, the University and state save money.

Since 25 percent of the University's utility costs are for auxiliaries like Food Services and the Department of Residence Life and Housing, which are supported by student fees, the students save money as well, Gaston said.

"These projects are all going to pay for themselves," Gaston said. "We save money, the students save money and the state of Texas saves money. It's a win-win-win situation."

Women's clinic at Beutler Health Center opens

The A.P. Beutler Health Center women's clinic opened to students this week. The new clinic extends gynecological services to eight hours a day Monday through Friday.

The clinic offers gynecological exams, birth control and women's health classes. The classes are a prerequisite for obtaining birth control from the center.

On staff is a nurse practitioner under the direct supervision of a physician, a licensed vocational nurse and a clerk. The nurse practitioner will handle most of the exams.

Previously, women had to see family physicians at Beutler for their health and gynecological needs. If women needed further medical attention, gynecologists from the Brazos Valley Women's Center were available for two hours a week at the center.

Bowen to host open forum on fee increase

Dr. Ray Bowen, Texas A&M president, is holding an open forum today to discuss the proposed increase of the general use fee. The forum is from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. in 292 MSC.

If proposed, the general use fee would increase from \$12 per semester credit hour to \$26 per semester credit hour.

A&M's Board of Regents will vote on the proposal later this summer.

Heavy fighting erupts in Sarajevo; Russian envoy pursues diplomacy

The city has not had electricity, water or regular food aid for the last month.

SARAJEVO, Bosnia-Herzegovina (AP) — Sirens sounded a general alert Tuesday and explosions rocked confrontation lines as artillery battles erupted anew around Sarajevo.

U.N. spokeswoman Maj. Myriam Sochacki said fighting began south of Sarajevo about 6 p.m., but U.N. observers were not able to provide further details due to restrictions on their movement.

Bosnian Serb media reported government forces renewed artillery attacks around Serb-held Hadzici southwest of Sarajevo. Fighting was also reported in northeastern Bosnia.

A three-day blitz by Bosnian government forces last week heralded the start of a summer-long offensive to try to crack the three-year Serb siege of Sarajevo. The Muslim-led government army hopes to capture strategic heights around the city, thus severing Serb supply routes.

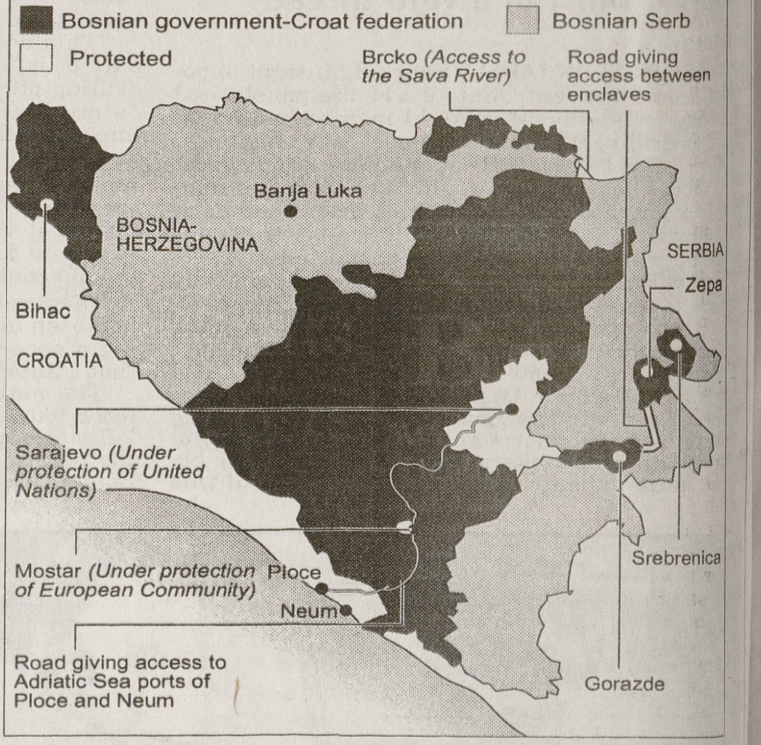

French peacekeepers at an observation post in a northern Sarajevo suburb fired four 90mm tank rounds Tuesday at a Serb tank after it fired 15 rounds at them. It was the first time this year that U.N. soldiers used a tank to respond to an attack, and at least one French round hit its target.

Tuesday's fighting came as Russian envoy Vitaly Churkin met Serbian and Bosnian Serb leaders on a peace initiative

Bosnia-Herzegovina partition plan

The peace plan proposed by Russia, Britain, France, Germany and the United States would divide Bosnia, giving 49 percent to the Serbs, who now control 70 percent of the country, and 51 percent to a Muslim-Croat federation.

masterminded by France, Russia and Serbia.

Churkin met in Belgrade with Serbian President Slobodan Milosevic for the second day Tuesday. Monday night, he held talks with Bosnian Serb leader Radovan Karadzic.

In Paris on Tuesday, French Foreign Minister Hervé De Charette met with his Bosnian counterpart, Muhamed Sacirbey.

Both the Muslim-led Bosnian government and the rebel Serbs have indicated they might be willing to return to peace talks if the conditions are right.

Government forces made substantial gains around Sarajevo last week, according to U.N. officials, and at least temporarily cut two Serb supply roads.

The Serbs apparently regained control of the road between Pale and the Serb-held Lukavica suburb.
