"It may happen that after the exchange between the committee and the candidate that the candidate may back out," Lee said.

The candidates all have at least 11 years of administrative experience and currently serve at universities similar to A&M in enrollment and budget.

One of the candidates, Jennus L. Burton, associate vice president for administrative services and campus administrative services officer at Arizona State University, has worked at the Tempe, Ariz., school since 1975.

Burton said he looked into the A&M position to tackle new problems.

"When you've been at a university for over 20 years, you start to look for new challenges,"

Burton said. "It's not that I am not happy at ASU. I've made a lot of friends here."

ASU has a total enrollment of approximately 42,000 students on three campus and a total annual budget of \$400 million.

Another candidate, Connie Sauer, vice president of administrative services for the 35,000-student Portland Community College in Portland, Ore., has been an administrator at several colleges, including Mesa College in Grand Junction, Colo., and San Jose State University in San Jose, Calif.

Sauer said she was not intimidated by the prospects of holding a key position at A&M, the nation's third-largest university.

"It's certainly a challenge," Sauer said. "But I worked at San Jose State for almost 10 years, and that's similar to Texas

A&M. I'm familiar with the big-university environment."

Dr. Paul Carlson, another candidate, worked for the Nebraska Department of Revenue before coming to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln in 1983. He currently serves as interim vice chancellor for the school of 24,000 students.

Carlson said that he was only vaguely familiar with A&M when he applied for the position, but was familiar with the state of Texas through his military service.

"I know that Texas A&M is going to be in the Big 12, and I'm familiar with a few of the traditions," Carlson said. "I'm learning more about the campus every day and hope to visit soon."

Dr. Jerry Gaston, A&M interim vice president for finance and administration, William

Krumm, associate vice president for business operations at the University of Michigan and Edward J. Demske, vice president for finance and business affairs and treasurer at Miami University in Ohio have also been selected for interviews. They could not be reached for comment.

The six candidates were chosen from a pool of 117 applications. Lee said the large number of applicants was expected considering the importance of the job.

Lee cited several qualifications needed for the position, including achievement at the administrative level.

The new vice president should meet certain character requirements as well, Lee added.

"We want the person who will be the best fit with the University at this time."

community as well. Dale Knobel served for eight years on the Historic Landmark Commission and is currently a member of the Brazos County Historical Commission.

Both Dale and Tina Knobel are members of the Bryan Heritage Society, and Tina Knobel serves as the membership chair.

The Knobels are active in the development of Heritage Park, located in Bryan, where the park gazebo was dedicated two years ago in memory of their son, Matthew Winsper Knobel.

Their interest in historical preservation stems from their upbringing, Dale Knobel said.

"Both my wife and I come from historic communities in Ohio," he said. "We have a sense of what preserving historical sites and structures can do for community pride."

The recipients of the Mayor's Award for Historic Preservation are chosen by the Historic Landmark Commission.

Tom King, member of the commission, said the award represents the importance of community preservation.

"It's important to the city commission and a lot of citizens to restore buildings in Bryan instead of destroying them," King said. "It brings them up-to-date so the history of the area is kept and maintained."

Justice won't bring case against Ticketmaster

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department declined Wednesday to bring an antitrust case against Ticketmaster, the nation's largest distributor of tickets for live sports events and concerts.

A target of widely publicized protests by the rock band Pearl Jam and by consumer groups, the Los Angeles-based company had been under investigation by the department's antitrust division for alleged anticompetitive and monopoly practices.

The company sold 55 million tickets last year for an estimated \$1.6 billion. Pearl Jam claimed the company priced tickets too high for the band's teenage fans.

In a two-sentence statement, the Justice Department said it had informed the parent company, Ticketmaster Holdings Group Inc., that "it is closing its antitrust investigation into that firm's contracting practices."

No lawsuit was filed so the case is over. But the antitrust division warned industry participants that the government "will continue to monitor competitive developments in the ticketing industry." That kind of statement means the government would have to see actions or evidence it currently cannot find before taking any action.

Department spokesman James Sweeney declined to elaborate on the reasons for the government's decision.

Ticketmaster earned an estimated \$240 million last year from its service fees on tickets sold for 3,000 locations around the nation.
