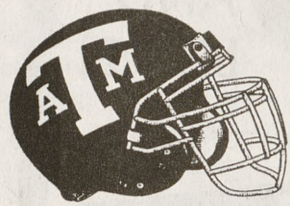

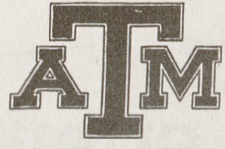

Doctor accused of trying to murder over bad letter of recommendation

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Security cameras in the Vanderbilt University Medical Center parking garage spotted Dr. Ray Mettetal in a wig, false beard and shoes with lifts.

In the pocket of the neurologist's padded trenchcoat was a large syringe that investigators say contained a lethal solution of salt water and boric acid.

Mettetal, police say, was bent on revenge: He was out to kill the department chairman whose refusal to write him a letter of recommendation more than 10 years ago destroyed his dream of becoming a brain surgeon.

Mettetal, 44, faces a preliminary hearing Friday on charges of attempted murder. If convicted, he could get up to 25 years in prison.

He has been held without bail since his arrest Aug. 22 by campus police who had been monitoring the garage's security cameras and got suspicious because of his shabby disguise.

The target of the alleged murder attempt, Dr. George Allen, chairman of Vanderbilt's neurosurgery department, was never harmed. Authorities said they don't know whether Mettetal had previously tried to contact him.

in there, that's when we are going to do it."

If a Senate meeting runs long, then only the first three hours of the recording will be broadcast.

Funding has been the main area of concern for Newman, who is responsible for implementation of the Television Communications Bill.

Newman said she plans to save the Senate money by utilizing student film crews and borrowing video equipment from campus departments.

"The funding situation of the Senate is definitely in limbo," she said, "so we won't be

using a professional crew to film the meetings."

Rodger Lewis, KAMU television program director, said professional crews, which charge up to \$125 per hour, are not necessary for this project.

Programs on cable channel 15 are not subject to the same federal communication standards as public television channels, Lewis said. Amateur videos, which would not meet picture quality or technical standards of public television stations, are acceptable for KAMU.

Lewis said he is excited about and supportive of the plan to air Senate meetings.

"It would give people a glimpse of what's going on with that segment of public education," he said.

a fee to help bring down the University's deficit and provide for increased salaries for faculty and staff, but he doesn't like the timing.

"We just got the Rec Center," he said.

"That's a \$50 increase. They seem to have added a few other things. They even raised the dorm fees."

"I've paid a lot this semester, and I haven't even paid that second bill. That's \$100 more."

Jessica Smith, a freshman biomedical science major, said she would support cutting the University deficit, but sees the

raise as too much.

"If it was maybe \$4 [instead of the proposed \$8 increase], I would support it," she said.

Smith said the amount was not too much to pay, but the University should cut something else first.

Chris Dale Johnson, a senior mechanical engineering major, said if A&M is going to pay its faculty better, it should invest in better quality professors.

"I'd like quality teachers that are more interested in teaching, rather than research," he said.

"If they're going to increase fees, I would like to actually see, not just hear about, more qualified professors."

Jennifer Johns, a freshman

business major, said she doesn't pay her own tuition and fees, so it doesn't hurt her much, but for others, it will be harder.

"It's not too drastic," she said. "But there are so many fees that it will all add up. I'm sure for some people it will be very bad."

Chad Estes, a freshman biomedical science major, said there is little A&M students can do about it.

"They're going to do whatever they want to do," he said.

"I think that they already have enough."

The A&M System will begin mailing new fee statements immediately. The new statements will require that students pay the difference between the old

fee and new fee.

All five students disliked the fact the fee would be charged immediately.

"It's unfair," Johns said. "For those who have to scrape up every penny, I think it puts them in a very bad situation."

Estes said that if the University wanted to raise fees, it should apply it to something more visible.

"I know what they need to do," he said. "They need to add more parking."

Johnson said A&M needs to change its priorities.

"If we're going to spend so much money on the Rec Center, then spend more on the library," he said.
