The Texas A&M women's soccer team kicked off its 1995 season against Mar-quette University Sunday in front of 619 sweltering fans at the Aggie Soccer Complex. Playing in scorching 100-degree heat, the Lady Aggies battled back all af-ternoon long and came away with a 7-4 victory in double overtime.

"I think we started off a little overconident and didn't play with the kind of intensity that we should have," said sopho-more forward Bryn Blalack. "We woke up when they scored on us twice in the early part of the first period. We just stepped pour play a notch and dug deep and ere able to come back and smoked them the end.


Marquette controlled the tempo early and took a quick lead with two goals in






