Former Gov. Richards recovers from surgery

AUSTIN (AP) — Former Gov. Ann Richards is out of the hospital and taking it easy after surgery on her broken left hand.

"She's resting at home," Bill Cryer, longtime spokesman for Richards, said Monday after her release from Seton Medical Center. "My understanding is she has turned off the telephone." Cryer said Richards was "a little under the weather" in the wake of Saturday's surgery.

Doctors inserted two pins into "tiny" bones in Richards' hand, said Seton spokeswoman Gayle Granberry. She added that Richards' doctors expect a full recovery.

Richards, 62, broke her hand last week when she fell while walking along the hike-and-bike trail around Austin's Town Lake, Cryer said.

Richards, who was governor from 1991 to 1995, broke her right ankle in 1993 while walking along the hiking trail near downtown Austin.

CityVote aims to force urban issues discussion

ST. PAUL, Minn. (AP) — The idea: an urban straw vote for president that would force candidates to talk about the problems of America's cities.

The reality: legal problems, political maneuvering and candidates with real elections on their minds.

CityVote is a nonbinding presidential vote coinciding with local elections on Nov. 7 in 20 U.S. cities, including Minneapolis, Boston and Newark, N.J.

But the Democratic National Committee is lobbying to keep President Clinton off the ballot. And major cities such as New York are not participating. City officials say a state law forbids straw votes at polling places.

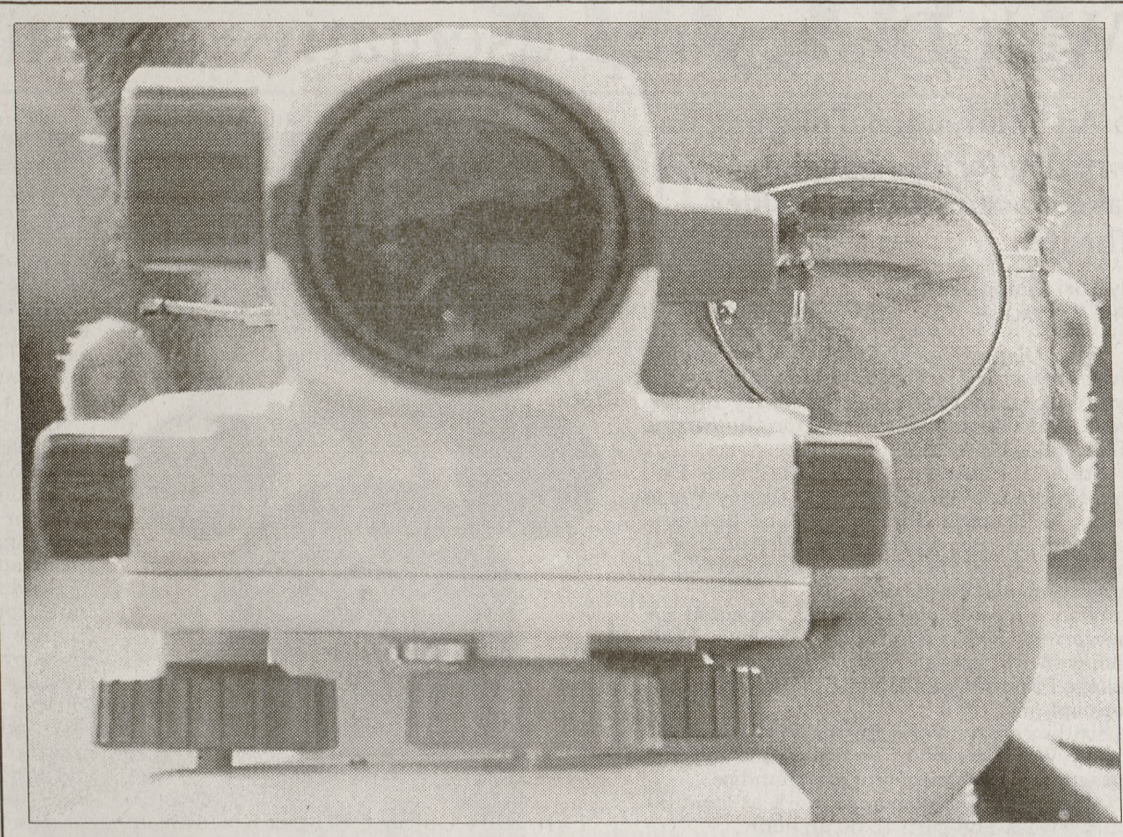
Clinton savors Bosnia, Israel-PLO success

WASHINGTON (AP) — Constantly criticized on foreign policy, President Clinton is savoring a rare moment of success as American diplomats broker Bosnian peace talks and the White House prepares for another Middle East signing ceremony.

It's welcome news for an administration battered by the Republican revolution on Capitol Hill. But, sadly for Clinton, foreign-policy achievements usually play better in the history books than in the voting booth.

Ask George Bush, the political hero of Desert Storm. Or Jimmy Carter, the architect of the first major peace agreement in the Middle East.

"Clinton will find that his foreign-policy record and 60 cents will get him a cup of coffee and two votes," said University of Virginia political scientist Larry Sabato.



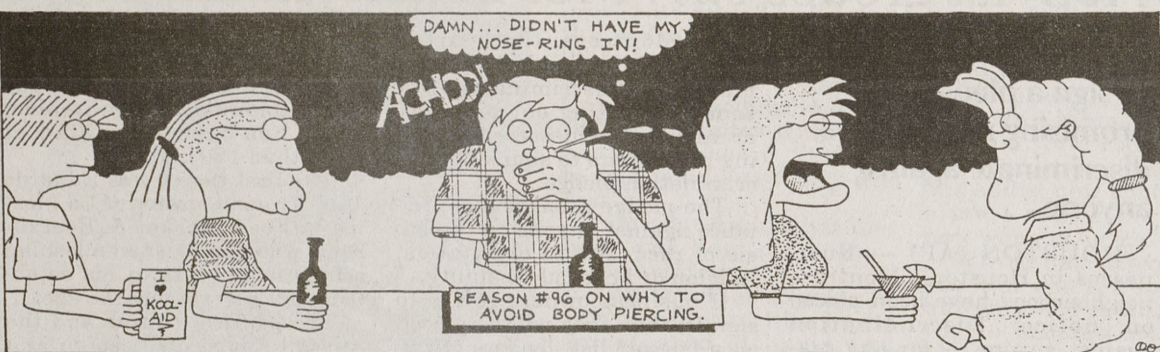

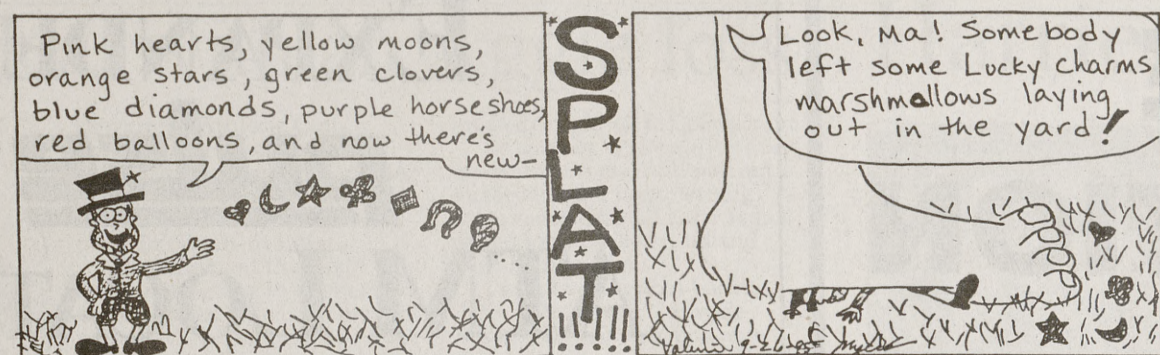
