Pope calls for America to be moral superpower in post-Cold War Era

Pope John Paul asked America to share its blessings with others, including its own poor and disadvantaged.

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) - Pope ohn Paul II returned Wednesay to America as a self-deribed pilgrim for peace, echog Pope Paul VI's 1965 appeal the United Nations: "No ore war, war never again."

In remarks before President nton and about 2,000 Catholic hoolchildren, the pontiff said the eals behind the founding of the nited Nations 50 years ago are ill needed in a world where "ancient rivalries and suspicions still

compromise the cause of peace."
Unlike their meeting two years ago in Denver, the pope did not challenge Clinton on his support for abortion rights. But John Paul repeated his call for America to be a moral superpower in the post-Cold War era, and he reminded the nation's leaders not to forget the poor as Congress considers cuts in social spending.

Your country stands upon the world scene as a model of a democratic society at an advanced stage of development. Your power of example carries with it heavy responsibilities," John Paul said. "Use it well, America! Be an example of justice and civic virtue, freedom fulfilled in goodness, at home and abroad.'

A leading figure in the fall of Communism in Eastern Europe, the pope will address the United Nations General Assembly today.

John Paul comes to the United States at a peak of personal popularity, with a best-selling book, "Crossing the Threshold of Hope," and polls showing that he is admired by large majorities of

But being personally beloved has not enabled the pope to sway many U.S. Catholics to follow traditional church teachings on issues such as artificial birth control and divorce.

In his airport speech, the pope asked America to continue to share its blessings with others, particularly its own poor and disadvantaged.

pal may still cause flooding for Texas coast

SOUTH PADRE ISLAND, Texas (AP)

- Hurricane Opal, the most powerful storm
to menace the upper Gulf Coast since Camille

Although the United States and Caribbean nations have been plagued by hurricanes in 1995, the treacherous devastated Mississippi in 1969, spun fero-clously toward the Florida Panhandle with 150 mph winds Wednesday.

Twenty-seven-foot swells produced by Opal in the Gulf of Mexico could make their way to the Texas coast, said Don Ocker, a meteorologist for the National Weather Ser-

vice in Brownsville. "Those swells will arrive tonight or tonorrow and should result in the worst looding of the whole episode," Ocker said. There's nothing life-threatening in this unless people don't realize what's happening, ut it is a threat to property.

The coast from Port O'Connor to rownsville remained under a flood warnng Wednesday.

For the past three mornings, tides have anged from 12 to 14 feet. There's no telling how much higher they could go once the swells reach the coast, but water could flow into town, Ocker said.

Jim Chisholm, Padre Island city managr, said areas along the beach that are ne to high tides have been shored up with an extra 3 feet of sand.

'We're certainly concerned," he said. We're telling people to be very careful and autious since we are going to have exremely high tides over the next two days.



surrounded by water. A severe storm would put the downtown under 20 or more feet of water. two-mile causeway to the mainland. People trapped on the island would face a storm surge that would submerge the entire island. Limited access would require evacuation to begin more than two days ahead of the storm.

Special issues: Evacuation along both populous coasts could create massive traffic jams on the Florida Turnpike, trapping evacuees on the road.
