### Four Americans awarded Nobel science awards

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two Americans and a Dutch scientist won the Nobel Prize in chemistry Wednesday for their controversial work with gases once used in spray cans. Other items are eating away Earth's ozone layer.

Two other Americans received physics Nobel for discovering atomic particles.

The chemistry prize went to Noe Molina of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, Sherwood Rowland of the University of California at Irvine and Paul Crutzen, a Dutch chemist working at the Max Planck Institute for Chemistry in Germany.

Work by Molina and Rowland predicting an ozone "hole" laid the groundwork for its discovery in 1985 over the South Pole.

The Nobel in physics went to Martin L. Perl of Stanford University and Frederick Reines of the University of California at Irvine.
