seem like a distant memory as the Aggies will have protected their state bragging rights and have established themselves as the dominant team in the SWC's final decade of existence.

However, the pressure is going to be on the Aggies.

The Longhorns pose a significant and completely legitimate threat to end the Aggies nation-leading 31-consecutive game home winning streak that they pride themselves on so much.

That would be a hard pill to swallow for players and fans that had national championship aspirations a few weeks ago.

It may be a mystery right now, but one thing is for certain; the better team will win the game. Hopefully, that group of players will be the home team.

Rockets improve to 3-0

□ Clyde Drexler led Houston with 26 points and 12 rebounds.

HOUSTON (AP) — Ha-keem Olajuwon scored 26 points and Clyde Drexler added 26 points and 12 rebounds Tuesday night as the Houston Rockets remained unbeaten with a 106-89 victory over the Milwaukee Bucks.

Olajuwon's performance left him with 19,970 career points. He could become the 21st player to reach the 20,000-point plateau on Wednesday when Houston.

Vin Baker had 21 points

and 13 rebounds to lead the Bucks.

Glenn Robinson and Marty Conlon each added 16 points, while Todd Day had 14.

The Rockets continued their trend of fast starts in November.

Last year, Houston began the season 9-0, and in 1993 they blasted off to a 15-0, record-tying start en route to their first NBA championship.

Overall, in the past three seasons, the back-to-back defending champions are 27-3 in the month of November.

The Rockets next travel to Miami to take on new Heat coach Pat Riley, their opposition in the 1994 Finals.

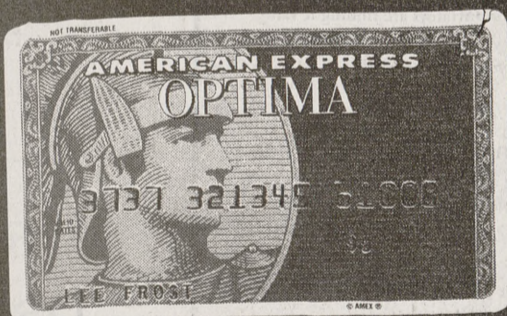
