Bengals dump Oilers, 32-25

□Houston dropped to 4-6 on the year with the loss.

HOUSTON (AP) — Jeff Blake threw a pair of touchdown passes to Carl Pickens and Cincinnati's defense hardly played Sunday like the NFL's worst as the Bengals downed the Houston Oilers 32-25.

The Bengals defense had been giving up more than 403 yards per game coming into Houston, putting them 30th and last in the league. But they came up with four sacks for 31 yards in losses, an interception and forced five fumbles, recovering three of them. The Bengals (4-6), who gave Houston 287 yards, also blocked a punt that led to a safety.

Blake, meanwhile, gave Pickens the Cincinnati TD pass receiving record with a 30-yard scoring toss in the third quarter. That gave Pickens 12 for the year, breaking the mark he set a year ago.

Pickens extended the record with his second touchdown, a 12-yard strike from Blake with 5:15 gone in the fourth quarter to make it 23-13. It was set up by a punt fumbled by Houston's Mel Gray.

The scoring passes also extended Blake's team record of TD passes to 17 consecutive games. Blake had entered the game leading the AFC with 18 TD passes.

In addition, he picked up 105 yards rushing on six carries.

Pickens finished with 108 yards on seven receptions. He also recovered two onside

kicks in the fourth quarter as the Oilers (4-6) tried to mount a late comeback. The Oilers lost for the first time in three

games and for the first time against the Bengals in Houston in 11 years.

They also lost starting quarterback Chris Chandler, who went down with a leg injury while being sacked and fumbling in the third quarter.

The Bengals set the tone early as Jeff Hill took the opening kickoff 46 yards and picked up another 15 on a face mask penalty to begin the game for Cincinnati at the Hous-

On second down, Blake went back to throw and ran away from the Oilers rush for 17 yards to the Houston 9. Two plays later, Eric Bieniemy scooted around the left side of the line to give the Bengals a 7-0 lead with just 1:43

gone in the game. The Oilers answered with a 40-yard field goal from Al Del Greco, his first of two, to make it 7-3

On the next series, Blake threw slightly behind Pickens streaking across the field and linebacker Eddie Robinson intercepted the pass and returned it 49 yards to put Houston ahead 10-7.

MIAMI (AP) — Dan Marino broke Fran Tarkenton's NFL career record for passing yardage Sunday by completing a 9-yard pass to Irving Fryar in the first quarter of the Miami Dolphins' game against New England.

The completion, 4:20 into the game, gave Marino 47,009 yards in 13 seasons. Tarkenton threw for 47,003 yards in 18 years.
