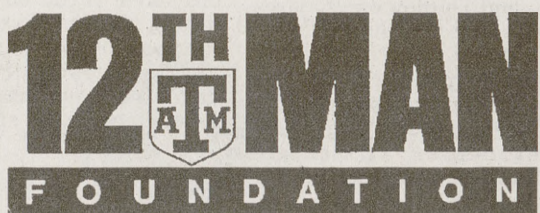

## 'I don't want a divorce'

Di says she was unfaithful and in love with another man

LONDON (AP) — Both Princess Diana and Prince Charles were unfaithful during their marriage, but she does not want a divorce, Diana said in an interview broadcast Monday night.

In her first public comments about her private life, Diana told the BBC: "I don't want a divorce." But she said she would be willing to discuss the possibility with Charles if he feels differently.

"I await my husband's decision on which way we're all going to go," she said. "... To date, neither of us has discussed this subject, though the rest of the world seems to have."

Diana said she had desperately wanted her marriage to succeed, in part because of the painful separation of her own parents.

"I desperately wanted it to work. I desperately loved my husband and I wanted to share everything with him, and I thought we were a very good team," she said. "I come from a divorced background, and I didn't want to go into that again."

Asked if her relationship with Army Maj. James Hewitt, her former riding instructor, had gone beyond a close friendship, Diana said: "Yes it did, yes." "Were you unfaithful?" asked reporter Martin Bashir.

"Yes, I adored him," Diana said. "Yes, I was in love with him."

Diana spoke quietly, almost wanly, though several times she flashed the shy smile that has been her trademark. She wore a navy suit with a white shell and dark stockings. Her hair looked slightly tousled.

Prince Charles, who formally separated from Diana in December 1992 after 11 years of marriage, was reported to be at his home in Gloucestershire. It was not known whether he was watching.

The BBC said about 15 million people were expected to watch the interview, recorded Nov. 5, on its "Panorama" program Monday night.

The princess was at a charity gala when the interview was broadcast, and Queen Elizabeth II and her husband Prince Philip — celebrating their 48th wedding anniversary — were attending the Royal Variety Show.

The interview was scheduled to air in the United States at 9 p.m. EST Friday on ABC-TV, which bought the American broadcast rights.

Diana said that after her separation, she became the object of an organized campaign by people in the royal household who saw her as a problem. She said visits abroad were blocked and letters didn't reach her.

"Everything changed after we separated, became very difficult," she said.

But she said of herself: "She won't go that's the problem. I will fight to the end, believe that I have a role to fulfill, and I've children to bring up."

Diana never pointed to any specific people in the royal household who feared or opposed her, but she said she was regarded as a problem, Diana said.

"I think every strong woman in history has walked down a similar path. I think it's the fear that causes the confusion and the fear. Why strong? Where does she get it from? Where's taking it? Where is she going to use it? Why public still support her?"

She denied having an adulterous relationship with her friend James Gilbey, but confirmed it was the man who called her "Squidgy" in a recently taped telephone conversation.

Diana said she knew that her husband renewed his old relationship with Camilla Bowles in 1986. "It was pretty devastating," she said.

Charles admitted in a 1994 television interview that he was unfaithful to Diana and their marriage broke down.

Diana said she became bulimic during her marriage, and "escaped" into a cycle of bulimia and vomiting.

"It was a symptom of what was going on in my marriage. I was crying for help, but I was getting wrong signals," she said.

She said she never asked for help from any member of the royal family.

"You have to know, when you have bulimia, you are very ashamed of yourself," she said.

Diana said she did not want to divorce because of concern for her sons, William, 13, and Harry, 11. "Our boys, that's what matters, isn't it?" she said.

She said when she and Charles separated, she told her son William: "If you find someone in life, you must hang on to it and look after it. If you were lucky enough to find someone who loves you, you were always protected."

She said she told William about Charles explaining that "although I still loved him, I couldn't live under the same roof with him."

Diana said she did not think she would be queen.

"I'd like to be a queen in people's hearts, but I don't see myself being queen of this country. I think many people would want me to be queen. When I say many people, I mean the whole world. I'm married into, because I decided that I'm a non-starter."

She would like to be an ambassador for the United Kingdom, Diana said.

"When I go abroad, we've got 60 to 90 people just from this country coming with me," she said. "So let's use it in a productive way in this country."

### ABC to air birthday bash for 'Blue Eyes'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Frank Sinatra joined a stage crowded with entertainers for a chorus of "New York, New York" during taping of an 80th birthday tribute for the blue-eyed one.

Sinatra's birthday isn't until Dec. 12, but a throng of celebrities running the gamut from rap to opera turned out Sunday to appear in the two-hour ABC special that will air in December. The date hasn't been announced.

The taping delighted the Shrine Auditorium crowd of 6,000, some of whom paid \$1,000 a ticket. The gala benefited AIDS Project Los Angeles and the Barbara Sinatra Children's Center at Eisenhower Medical Center near Palm Springs.

Tony Bennett, Bob Dylan, Bruce Springsteen, Little Richard and Hootie and the Blowfish sang tributes to Sinatra as he sat at a table with his wife, Barbara and daughters Christina and Nancy.

A movie screen displayed a clip of Sinatra singing "Old Man River" in the 1946 MGM musical "Till the Clouds Roll By."

Referring to the movie, Ray Charles cracked: "I didn't see the picture. But I understand you were in a white suit, with a white band, on a white set singing a black song. Now I'm going to do it — my way." His way was in his trademark rocking style, which won him a standing ovation.

Brooks on the prowl for new musicians

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Musicians, prepare your resumes. Garth Brooks is looking for two band members who aren't obsessed with job security.

Brooks has a new album out next week and is booked for a U.S. tour, but he lost two musicians to solo careers — guitarist Ty England and the country star's own sister, bassist Betsy Brooks.

"The two faces that are probably most known to people, Ty and Betsy, are lost," Brooks said. "So it'll be tough."

Brooks said he told both they can rejoin the band any time.

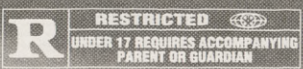
