Students can prevent holiday theft

□ The University is not liable for items damaged or stolen from residence halls. UPD suggests students take valuables with them or mark them with an identification number.

Students need to take precautions to keep their homes and personal belongings safe over the winter holiday, University Police Department officials said.

University police said the winter break is often a prime time for burglars to invade student homes because many students leave town for the duration of the break.

Sgt. Betty Lemay of the UPD Crime Prevention Unit said students can take several precautions to avoid becoming a

"If they are living on campus, they need to take valuables with them," Lemay said. 'For those items that they leave behind, they need to have them identified with a driver's license number.

Residence hall directors have engraving kits to help students mark items like stereos, televisions and computers with li-

Another important precaution, Lemay said, is to make sure all windows and doors are locked, especially in the resi-

Basically, what thieves do is try the windows," she said, "and if they ever get in, they have access to the whole [residence hall] and the rooms that ar unlocked."

Lt. Bert Kretzschmar of the UPD Crime
Prevention Unit said securing a residence

involves communication between roommates, especially regarding who is leaving town last and is responsible for checking

"Make sure if you're living with roommates to coordinate with each about locking windows are secured and latched, and make sure doors are closed and locked." and doors," he said. "Make sure all windows

In addition to latching windows, Kretzschmar said it is important to make sure blinds or shades are closed, so thieves can-

not see inside.
"While you're out window shopping for Christmas gifts," he said, "there are people window shopping at your apartment

Other theft deterrents are light timers, Lemay said. Timers that turn the lights on and off give the appearance of someone being home

"Lighting is the least expensive, most vention tool there ping at your apartment." is," she said.

University police also suggest having newspaper subscrip-

tions and mail stopped for the duration of the break. "A big stack of newspapers building up outside of a residence is a dead giveaway

that no one is home," Kretzschmar said. Rusty Thompson, assistant director of residence life and housing, said on-campus residents have been sent a letter of-fering tips on securing their rooms during the holidays.
