editor, said that the SSFAC's recommendation's should not be passed.

Members of the SSFAC, the GSC and the Student Senate Internal Affairs Committee have all acknowledged that the SSFAC's current recommendation is a flawed document," he said. "For each of these organizations to support such a document is inexcusable.

"The MSC is being asked to pay for a SSFAC miscalculation, and The Battalion is being told it should accept a 94percent decrease because last year's SSFAC allocated more money than was available. If the Senate and the GSC choose to support this document, the message is being sent that 'everything's OK.' And that is far from the truth."
