Forty students representing 30-35 organizations are members of Resurrection Week committees.

Klawitter said that any evangelical Christian organization is allowed to participate and plan the week's events, and everyone is invited to attend.

Both Woodward and Klawitter stressed the fact that although everyone is allowed to attend the activities, a group must believe in the same fundamental beliefs as Resurrection Week committee members to fund or organize the events.

A group of Mormon students offered to help organize the first Resurrection Week, Woodward said, but were turned down. Since Mormons' basic foundation of beliefs differ from evangelical Christ-

presenting the gospel to them. "I think Resurrection Week has made me examine what I believe,"


Sutton said. "Resurrection Week has helped me affirm my own beliefs and given me an opportunity to share my faith with others.
