The Pamper Pole is a 35-foot telephone pole that you have to jump from and catch a trapeze," Noland said. "You have to learn to trust that the other students will be there for you if you fall, and that's a hard thing to do. It's really neat when someone who's scared of heights gets up there and catches the trapeze.

Students on the Pamper Pole are secured by a belay, a rope attached to the student and to three or four other students on the ground. The students on the ground are responsible for the oth-er student's safety.

Eissinger said she would encourage anyone to take the course.


"It's different from anything else in the curriculum," she said. "Everything else is book knowledge. This forces them to work with others and how to handle group situations and relationships.
