top priority is to "make students feel like they have a voice in the office of the student body president.'

Within the next few weeks, Baggett will select his vice president and other executive council members.

Baggett's election marked the end of a campaign many described as highly controversial.

For example, at an April 3 rally held on campus in support of affirmative action, a student declared to a crowd gathered at Rudder Fountain that she would not vote for Baggett because she questions Baggett's willingness

to embrace diversity. Laurie Peebles, a member of Baggett's 20-person campaign staff and senior nutrition major, said Baggett handled rumors that surfaced during the campaign well, setting a good exam-

ple and earning respect.

"He said if you can't win a campaign on your own merits," Peebles said, "you don't deserve to win.'

But "overcoming stereotypes and rumors" is an obstacle Hurd said Baggett will have to face going into his presidency.

He said he hopes those who do not like the Corps of Cadets will not automatically discredit

Baggett.
"Everyone has to see him as Carl Baggett the president and not Carl Baggett the member of the Corps of Cadets," he said. "They have to judge him on his actions. I hope everybody has an open mind and gives Carl a chance right from the beginning." Amy Vandaveer, a member of

Baggett's campaign staff and senior English and speech communications major, said this year's campaigns were marked by an excessive amount of mudslinging. "I think the Student Govern-

ment campaigns need to focus more on Aggieness and what's going to benefit A&M," Vandaveer said, "rather than trying to trash the other candidates.

Members of Ryan Shopp's campaign staff agreed that there were too many rumors circulated about all of the candidates in this year's campaigns, but some said the mudslinging was even worse last year.

in the Air Force," she said. "They sent about 500 units to San Antonio for the man."

Tally said that though A&M earns an average of 3,000 credits each year, most of them go unused. Credits expire after one year.

She said people often donate blood to get the free T-shirt and sandwiches, never realizing they have an opportunity to determine who will benefit from blood donations.

Elizabeth Stubbs, a Blood-Care representative, said in a recent press release that 2,590 people donated blood at last year's drive, and she is expecting 1,600 people to turn out this year.
"We have always had a great

turnout at A&M and are expecting another one this year," Stubbs said.

Pam Powell, BloodCare vice president of donor services and community development, said the drive will benefit people in need of blood for transfusions and other medical procedures.

"Nationally, approximately 4 million patients need blood transfusions every year," Pow-

ell said.
"Without blood from the community in supply, collected from drives such as the Texas A&M drive, many medical and surgical procedures would not

be possible.
"The lives of cancer, cardiac and organ transplant patients, as well as seriously ill newborns, would be lost."
