

Rangers' loss simply Gross

The Yankees bombed Texas for 12 runs in the rout.

NEW YORK (AP) — Andy Pettitte won his third straight start, and Mariano Duncan drove in three runs Sunday to lead the New York Yankees over the Texas Rangers 12-3.

Kevin Gross (2-1) was knocked out after 1 1-3 innings, matching the shortest start of his career. He gave up five runs and six hits.

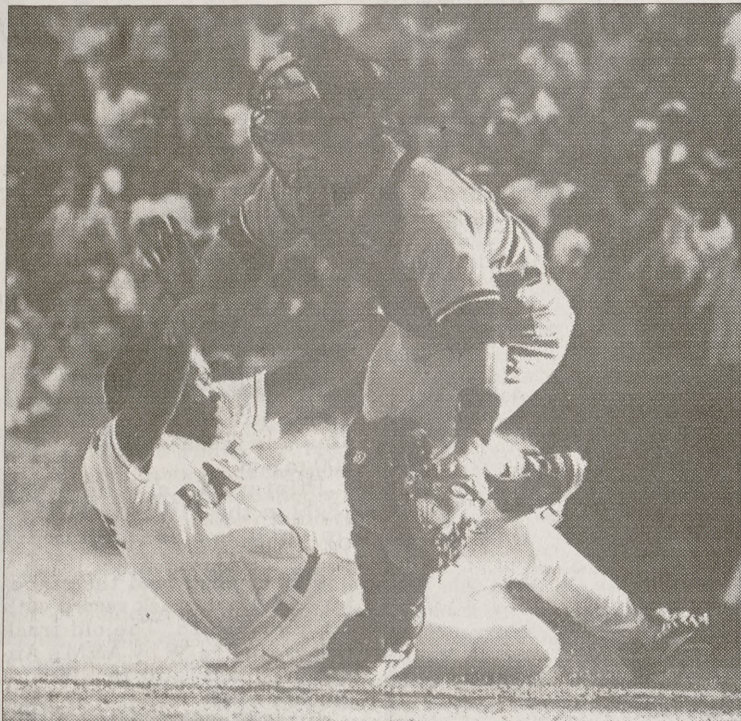
After opening the season with seven straight wins, the Rangers have lost three of their last four. Texas has lost nine of its last 10 games at Yankee Stadium.

Pettitte (3-0) allowed two runs and eight hits in eight innings, lowering his ERA to 2.57. He struck out five and walked two.

Jim Leyritz hit a two-run single in the first. Rusty Greer hit an RBI single in the second, but the Yankees chased Gross in the bottom half on Gerald Williams' RBI triple, Bernie Williams' run-scoring single and Tino Martinez's sacrifice fly.

Greer hit a solo homer in the fourth to make it 5-2, but Duncan hit a two-run single off Mark Brandenburg in the bottom of the inning. Paul O'Neill sprained his right ankle sliding home on the play and came out of the game. He was listed as day-to-day.

Duncan homered off Matt Whiteside in the sixth, and the Yankees made it 10-2 in the

seventh on Martinez's RBI groundout and Robert Eenhorn's sacrifice fly. Gerald Williams added a two-run homer in the eighth, and Lou Frazier hit an RBI single in the ninth.

The last time Gross was

knocked out after 1 1-3 innings was at Atlanta on Aug. 7, 1992, when he was pitching for Los Angeles.

Tim Raines who is expected to join the Yankees on Tuesday in Milwaukee, was 0-for-3 at Columbus on Saturday.

Reds' late heroics sweep Astros away

CINCINNATI (AP) — Vince Coleman homered and singled home the go-ahead run Sunday as the Cincinnati Reds blew a five-run lead but recovered for a 9-8 victory and a doubleheader sweep of the Houston Astros.

Joe Oliver and Eric Davis homered to drive in all of Cincinnati's runs in a 5-3 first-game win. Cincinnati's first doubleheader sweep of the Astros since Sept. 22, 1992, left the teams with a split of their fourgame series.

Despite the sweep, the Astros are still ahead of last year, when they lost 12 of 13 against Cincinnati and finished nine games behind the NL Central champions.

Coleman led off with a homer in the second game, starting a five-run first inning off Doug Drabek. After Houston tied it 7-7 in the seventh, Coleman singled home a tie-breaking run in the bottom of the inning off Anthony Young (0-1) and Eddie Taubensee had a sacrifice fly.

Jeff Shaw (2-1) got the win with one shaky inning. Hector Carrasco gave up a misplayed RBI triple to Jeff Bagwell in the eighth, but Jeff Brantley pitched the ninth for his second save of the day and his fourth overall.

The Reds had built a 5-1 lead by taking advantage of one of Drabek's wildest performances. John Smiley's two-run single — the first of his three hits — highlighted the 10-batter inning.

Drabek gave up five hits and six runs over 3 1-3 innings and walked seven, matching his career high. The last time he walked seven was July 29, 1990 against Philadelphia.

The Astros caught up by getting solo homers by Bagwell and Rick Wilkins in the sixth off Smiley, then batting around against the bullpen for four runs and a 7-all tie in the seventh.
