Tornadoes: Emergency sirens failed

217 businesses were damaged, 35 houses, five apartments and 78 businesses were beyond repair. Damage was put in the millions of dollars.

The tornadoes were part of a series of storms that moved into Arkansas from Oklahoma.

Radio and TV reports had warned that storms were coming, but a tornado knocked down telephone lines that would have carried word to emergency workers to start sirens, Fort Smith police Cpl. Tom Randolph said.

In Fort Smith, a 2-year-old girl and a 5-year-old boy were crushed to death.

"The house had fallen on him," said Michelle Hooper, a neighbor of Kyle Richard Johnson's. "He was dead instantly."

Six blocks away, rows of 30-foot trees 2 feet in diameter lay across High Street, where Angelica Marie Flemming died.

In St. Paul, where police found the bodies of a man and his son in the ruins of their house Monday.

"It just disintegrated as I understand it," Deputy Bill Mason said.

The man's wife was critically injured. Their names were not immediately released.

In Fort Smith, firefighters searched their house-to-house search would last into the night. The worst damage was in a historic district downtown — where some of the buildings date to the 1800s — and a residential area 1 1/2 miles away. Several buildings downtown collapsed.

The main sewage treatment plant "just disappeared" as well, Randolph said. "There were several buildings down there and they are just gone."

Roger Weaver, 32, of Alma, said he had been up all night helping to move debris from the streets so that balance and fire trucks could pass.

On his way to the scene, he saw four tractor-trailers on Interstate 40 on their sides, "all of them pointing in different directions."

The twister lifted a pickup truck into the air and sent it nosediving into a house and about 3 feet into the ground, he said.

Lisa Nolen, a senior environmental design major, said the design she worked on tries to generate a warm, homey feeling.

Her group's inspiration, she said, came from a child who wished "there were little houses for kids to stay in, instead of big hospitals."

"The street-side of the day-care center looks like the old hospital," she said.

"The side facing the hospital looks like a house, so hopefully kids won't be frightened when they approach it."

Molly McCoy and Danielle Napolio, junior environmental design majors, designed a program promoting fitness as a foundation of health.

They said expanding the center that emphasizes regular fitness routines is one of the ways to improve and maintain good health.
