# 'Cheerleader Mom' gets 10-year term

HOUSTON (AP) — "Cheerleader Mom" Wanda Webb Holloway pleaded no contest Monday and received 10 years in prison but could be eligible for freedom in six months.

Her plea came less than a month before she was to be retried on charges she hired a hit man to kill the mother of her daughter's cheerleading rival.

"Everyone was in concurrence that if she were willing to do this, it would be the best for everybody, explained Jack Zimmermann, Holloway's attorney. "It's obviously not the best for her, because it involves being in custody."






