Students are divided into groups of 30 firefighters who work together throughout the day. The groups move from station to station extinguishing different types of fires, learning how to react in different situations. The amount of gas or chemical being pumped into a fire is regulated by a training staff member. After students learn to extinguish fires, they are drilled on the efficiency of their work.

Wayne Fellers, program manager for the private sector, said the students have a chance to show their talent.

"Around the third day of class, the students will get a radio message," Fellers said. "We'll create a scenario like something that could happen at their facility."

"We do rescues at night and we've had a guy hanging by a harness from a building that needed to be rescued."

Fellers said firefighting is a labor of love.

"[The] emphasis [is] on training for the safety and

well-being of the citizens," Fellers said. "People do it for their love of the work. There's not a lot of pay in it, but it's the inner satisfaction that you get from knowing you've trained yourself to save a lot of lives."

The cost of using the school is about \$250 a day per student. Tuition pays for fuel and other burning substances like hay.

The structures are built out of cinder blocks and steel. The steel structures are protected from the flames by a series of sprinklers that keep them cool.

She said she had a good time. But she noticed that when a category of questions was presented to identify a classmate, the description resembled the description of a transsexual. "Who changed their name?" was not among them. "I figured they did not know how to do it in her case," Sandra McArthur, a GLBA member who spent four years in the Corps and attended Frye's

lecture, said after she "came out" her sophomore year, it was difficult to maintain her previous lifestyle, especially as a Corps member.

Sandra said when she wanted to go on a date, she would say it was with a friend, instead of her girlfriend.

"I know for certain there are people in the Corps who completely are in the closet and somewhat out of the closet," she said.

Sandra said upperclassmen

exert influence on their freshmen and because these freshmen somewhat idealize them, they tend to hold the same views as their mentors.

"Someone who might have been indifferent (about gays) winds up being hateful," she said.

Bradley said since the transgender movement is new, they are unsure of where to turn and who will help them.

"It's going to be a lot more difficult than the gay and lesbian movement has been," Frye said.
