Police search for UNT student's killer

DALLAS (AP) — Police were looking for several men involved in the fatal shooting of a University of North Texas student from South Korea.

Eun-ha Suh, 22, was shot twice early Sunday after she and her boyfriend fled from an altercation in a Dallas nightclub.

Police said she exited Interstate 35E in Farmers Branch and headed south when shots were fired about 2 a.m. from a car that pulled alongside on a service road.

Her boyfriend ducked down but was grazed by a bullet. He managed to stop the car and then drove her to Parkland Hospital Health System, where she was pronounced dead.

Suh was enrolled in the Intensive English Language Institute at UNT, a school official said.

Police believe the two or three suspects are regulars at The Ritz Rock, on Walnut Hill Lane in northwest Dallas. They were believed to be driving a red four-door midsize sedan.

Jury selection for DWI case begins

CORPUS CHRISTI, Texas (AP) — Jury selection began Monday in a drunken-driving case that could become precedent for deciding when a fetus is legally declared human in Texas.

Frank Flores Cuellar is accused of intoxication manslaughter in the death of a child who was still in her mother's womb when Cuellar

allegedly slammed his Chevrolet Blazer into their car on June 15.

Just hours after the accident Jeannie Coronado, who was seven and a half months pregnant, gave birth to Krystal Zuniga by emergency Caesarean section. The baby, weighing just 4 pounds, survived birth but had suffered extensive brain damage. She died 44 hours later.

Prosecutors contend Cuellar, who has at least two previous drunk-driving convictions, should be held responsible for Krystal's death.

However, defense attorney Howard Marshall argues that Cuellar should not be charged under Texas law because Krystal had not been born at the time of the accident.

New Latin dance battles Macarena

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) — A sexy sway of the hips. A few pelvic thrusts. Some simple arm movements. A catchy Latin rhythm. Put it all together and you likely have the next step in the Latin dance craze.

Move over Macarena, here comes the tongoneo.

In Spanish, a tongoneo is a seductive hip movement. As a new song and dance, will it follow the Macarena to the top of the charts?

The tongoneo has already hit gold in Mexico and the United States. But the bigger hopes are for a successful crossover into the English-language market.

It's getting a big-bucks marketing boost from record label Program Latino and Miller Brewing Co., which sponsors a tongoneo dance competition and tour.
