Even after participating in the Junior Nationals while in junior high and devoting herself to high school swimming, Karnes did not look ahead to college.

'I wasn't considering competing in college when I got to high school," Karnes said.

'Swimming was just my best sport and also my favorite, so I decided to focus on it.

Based on the success she experienced at Clements High School in Sugarland, Karnes made a wise decision. She was a four-time high school All-American, won two titles at the 1994 Texas state meet, and participated in the Senior Nationals while attending Clements.

In two years of NCAA compe-

tition, Karnes has earned honorable mention All-American accolades twice. Last year, she placed 14th in the 200-freestyle at the NCAA Championships and qualified for the 500-free and 200-butterfly,

while also swimming in the 200-, 400- and 800-free and the 400medley races.

"Stacie believes she can do more now," Wagner said. "This summer, she scored lifetime bests at the U.S. Senior Nationals."
