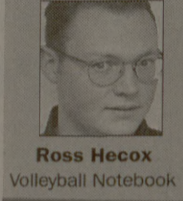

**10th-ranked Lady Ags still confident despite loss**

Texas A&M Volleyball Head Coach Laurie Corbelli has said it all along — on any given night, any team in the top 20 can beat any other team in the top 20. That's just how volleyball is, and her players completely understand the concept.

That is why the Lady Aggies (16-3, 7-1 in the Big 12) are winning and why they remain confident even after their loss to the University of Nebraska last Friday. A&M is the 10th-ranked team in the nation and believes on any given night it can beat a Nebraska or a Texas.

The Lady Aggies learned what it takes to win big matches when they demoralized the Longhorns in a three-game sweep Sept. 25, and they also know what needs to be fixed to beat the Huskers next time. Expect the team to be ready for the second go-round against Texas (Nov. 13) and Nebraska (Nov. 30).

 Of course, A&M knows the pendulum can swing the other way. Lower-ranked teams, and even unranked teams, are taking their best punches when they face the Lady Aggies. A&M has been prepared throughout the season for pesky upstarts and has not allowed them to pull off any upsets.

Corbelli said she is enjoying this season because of the Big 12 competition and — more importantly — her players.

"I'm really happy with their state of mind," Corbelli said. "They are coachable, they respond well, and they are dedicated. This team has a lot of vision."

Extremizing the bug  
 One factor that hurt the team's performance against Nebraska was the absence of a healthy Kristie Smedsrud. The junior outside hitter was battling the flu and hit for only a -.021 efficiency.

Freshman outside hitter Summer Strickland is still hampered by a sprained ankle. She played briefly against the University of Colorado, but she has not recuperated 100 percent. Her complete rehabilitation is crucial to the depth of the right outside hitter position.

 Over the weekend, the Lady Aggies struggled to hit their way against the Huskers, the team's only .153, and followed with a .159 percentage against the falcons. It was quite a drop from its .258 hitting percentage going into the weekend.

A&M remained at No. 10 in USA Today/AVCA poll this week and places second behind the ranked Nebraska in the Big 12. The Huskers own a 8-0 mark, No. 9 Texas and No. 23 Kansas State University are tied in the 12 with records of 6-2.

**Yankees even World Series with 8-6 win over Braves**

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Braves took one of the biggest gambles in baseball history. The New York Yankees turned it into one of the biggest comebacks in World Series history.

Pinch-hitter Wade Boggs drew a bases-loaded walk with two outs in the 10th inning following a questionable intentional walk, and the Yankees beat Atlanta 8-6 Wednesday night to even the Series at two games each.

A three-run homer by Jim Leyritz in the eighth inning tied the game as the Yankees rallied from a 6-0 deficit. Two innings later, they matched the second-biggest comeback in Series play with a win that made them 7-0 on the road in this postseason.

With two outs in the 10th, Tim Lincecum drew a walk from loser Steve Avery and moved to second on a single by Derek Jeter. When Braves manager Bobby Cox went to the mound and elected to intentionally walk Bernie Williams, the MVP of the AL championship series and a hero in the Yankees'

victory the previous night, rookie Andy Fox was on deck, but Cox clearly knew that Boggs was still left on the bench.

Boggs, a future Hall of Famer with already 2,697 career hits, had not started two games because of a back injury and .171 average in the postseason.

followed with a pop that landed in the outfield.

The win in the longest game in World Series history — 4 hours, 17 minutes — ensured New York would return to Yankee Stadium this weekend.

On Thursday night, in what will be the last game ever at Atlanta-Fulton County Stadium, Braves ace John Smoltz will pitch against New York's Andy Pettitte in Game 5.
