"The purpose is to show moms a picture of A&M, ease their concerns, and help them understand the freshmen, like the problems they're going through and adjustments they're making." After the yell practice, the moms were encouraged to explore College Station and catch a glimpse of students' weekend activities. Ann Jeffcoats said she saw first hand what her son, Aaron Jeffcoats, does for fun by surprising him at a local hangout. "My first time at (Hurricane) Harry's, I bumped into my son and his friend," she said. "His friend

saw me but didn't know who I was, so to be funny, he said, 'Oh, Aaron, there's your mom,' and they turned around and it was me. I was there. My son knew I was in town, but he was still surprised." On Saturday morning the mothers ate breakfast at University Tower, where Student Body President Carl Baggett greeted them on behalf of the student body. After breakfast, the Student Senate and the MSC Hospitality Committee gave the moms a tour of campus. For lunch, the moms dined on Northgate at the Dixie Chicken. Don Ganter, Dixie Chicken owner, gave out T-shirts and a table with four chairs from the restaurant as door prizes. From there, the moms at-

tended interest sessions in the MSC. Different session topics included "Letting Go — How to Parent an Aggie" and "Corps Moms' Survival Kit." Aggie Stryker, a counselor for Aggie Mom's Fish Camp, said the interest sessions were meant to reassure mothers' insecurities. "It's about hearing other moms having the same problems and getting ideas on how to keep your spirits up," she said. "It's just an extension of being a mother." Aggie Mom's Fish Camp continued with a barbecue on Saturday night with Brooke Leslie, former student body president, as a guest speaker. Sunday morning, the moms concluded the weekend with another yell practice and camp skill performances.
