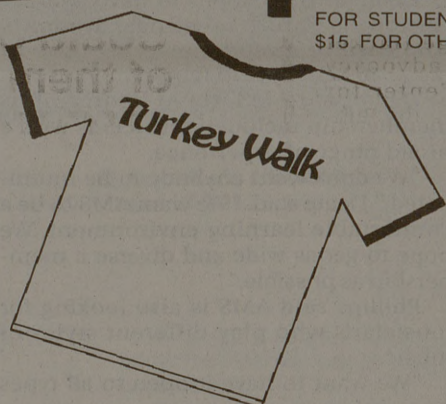

**Most inmates say they're Baptist**

AUSTIN (AP) — It may just be because Grandma tried to steer them to church, but more prisoners say they're Baptist than any other denomination.

According to new figures from the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, 39,781 inmates — or more than 30 percent of the population of 131,316 — call themselves Baptist.

The only other category in the double digits is Catholic, topping 18 percent of Texas prisoners. A whopping 22 percent are categorized as "unknown," representing inmates who didn't say or didn't care when asked for their religious denomination.

The rest of the inmates are divided among the categories of Christian Church, Methodist, Church of Christ, Pentecostal, Muslim, Protestant, Jewish, non-denominational, no religious preference and other.

Information gathered on inmates' religion is used in the Criminal Justice Department's religion programs to provide prisoners with appropriate services, said Jerry Groom, director of chaplains and an Assemblies of God minister.

The relatively large number of Baptists simply reflects the overall population in Texas, he added. A number of prisoners may not actually have a church affiliation,

Groom said, but reach back to their childhood when as about religion.

The prison system has 145-time chaplains, 25 part-time numerous volunteers, Groom said.

Religious programs don't just include life skills, therapeutic programs and literacy efforts. They also are provided to inmates' families and staff, Groom said.

About 25 percent of prisoners participate actively in religious full-time basis, Groom estimated. Particular programs and draw more interest.

**The Texas LoanSTAR Program, an Internet-based Convention Program for Texas State Agencies**

The Texas LoanSTAR program is a \$8.6 million revolving loan program that was initiated in 1989 by the State Energy Conservation Office. LoanSTAR provides revolving, low-interest loans for energy conserving changes to be made in public buildings and schools in Texas. Participants must repay the loans in 5 years or less based on the estimated savings. As of August 1996, LoanSTAR has saved the state of Texas over \$5 million dollars by reducing the amount of energy consumed in state agencies.

A unique feature of the LoanSTAR program is the training that has been installed in over 300 buildings to measure savings. The Internet-based monitoring network includes A&M University, Texas A&M Kingsville, the University of El Paso, Texas Southern University, and Texas Tech University.

This presentation will provide a brief overview of the LoanSTAR program and will discuss how the Internet has day-to-day efforts of the program.
