Dr. Bill Kibler, associate vice president for student affairs, said an across-the-board raise has not been given in a long time.

'Generally, A&M uses a merit pool raise, which is currently proposed by President Bowen," he said. "Each department is allotted a

set amount of additional money to grant raises.' Thomas H. Taylor, assistant vice president for finance, said the University establishes parameters for each department.

"For example, the overall salary increase can't exceed 3 percent of the current salary base," he said. "If a department is given \$10,000, it's up to the department head to spread it out and give everyone a raise or

just give a few faculty raises."

The past two years, the University has devoted \$5 million of the GUF to salary increases.

"Because of the GUF increase in the spring of 1996, \$2.2 million was generated to increase the graduate system stipends," Taylor said. "We have to stay competitive in all areas of our faculty and staff.'

Based on nine-month faculty salaries of 1995, full professors at the University of Texas averaged \$76,393, compared to \$71,568 at A&M. A public hearing regarding the increase will

be held Monday at 7 p.m. in Rudder Theatre. Taylor said students should take advantage of the opportunity to learn more about the proposed increase.

"We encourage everyone to attend the open public hearing Monday," Taylor said. "It will benefit all students to know how these salary raises will affect A&M as an institution of higher learning.'
