Most students say that from the time they enter A&M as freshmen, they learn and grow not only from their classroom education but from their college experiences.

"Students can choose to be wallets, with the administration at them purely as assets, or they can get involved, get informed, and have their own opinion and become a customer of the University and have the administration treat them accordingly," Therivel said.

Therivel said Student Government will be conducting another survey over the telephone to get a wider cross-section of students. The problem with the first survey, he said, was that they were distributed only on campus and in a particular area. Therefore, off-campus student opinions were not equally represented.

"Too often, Student Government makes decisions on what involved students want, instead of on what all students want," he said.

Mayfield said a random phone survey will be conducted asking the questions proposed on the initial survey. He said Student Government will have the surveys completed by Christmas break because the Board of Regents will meet to discuss the survey early next year.
