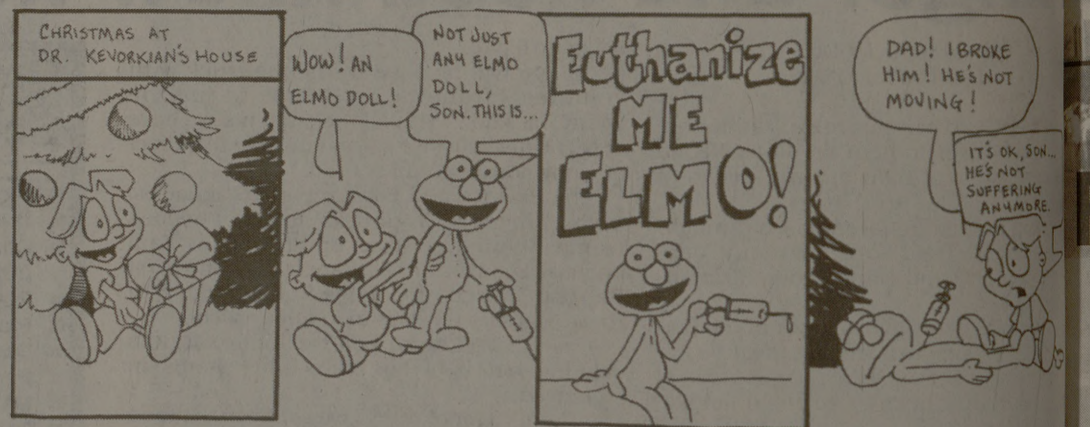

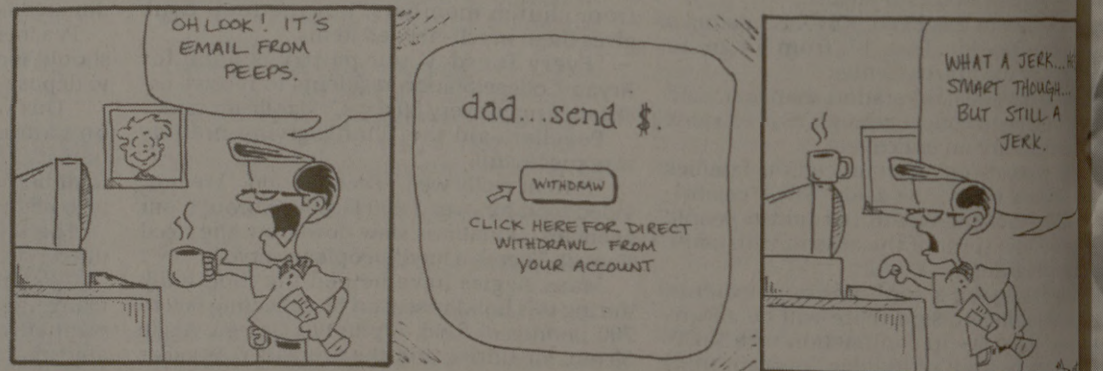

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Olympics
This summer, the United States led the Olympic games in Atlanta, with a total of 101 medals — 44 gold, 32 silver and 25 bronze.

The games began on Saturday, July 20, and ended on Sunday, Aug. 4. More than 11,000 athletes represented 197 countries, making it the largest Olympics ever.

Matthew Hunt, a senior finance major, worked for Reebok, issuing uniforms to athletes from more than 45 countries.

"I felt it (the Olympics) was pretty cool — it was right in our backyard," Hunt said.

He said he "fell in love with the Olympics," and is trying now to find a job with a company that is going to the 2000 Sydney Olympics.

Although Hunt enjoyed his experiences at the Atlanta Olympics, he said the games had a downside, too. "I think it became too commercialized," Hunt said. "It was all about money."

Hunt said the athletes were nice and friendly, but the advertisements surrounding the Olympic games were overbearing.

"I thought the Olympics were supposed to be about athletics, not fighting for dollars," he said.

Hunt said he was able to watch a few of the women's basketball

games during his stay in Atlanta.

"It was interesting to see how well the women's sports did," he said.

A week into the games on July 27, a pipe bomb exploded in Centennial Park, killing one woman and injuring more than 100 people.

Hunt was asleep when the bomb exploded, but his roommate woke him to tell him about the bomb.

The explosion stunned the nation and Olympic participants.

"I couldn't believe it (the bomb) happened," Hunt said. "I was just in shock. I didn't think the games should be stopped."

Hunt said the unexpectedness of the bomb showed that the United States is not as safe as it seems.

"We're really not as safe as we think we are," he said. "You think in America you're safe because this is America."

As of Oct. 26, Richard Jewell, the security officer who discovered the bomb, was the only suspect in the case. He was cleared as a suspect this fall.

The FBI is still searching for the bomber.

Presidential Election
On Nov. 5, President Bill Clinton defeated Bob Dole to return to office for a second term. He will be inaugurated in January.

Mother Teresa
Nobel Peace Prize winner Mother Teresa has been in and out of the hospital this year. The Rev. Mike Sis of St. Mary's Catholic Church said

the world has been watching her hospitalization closely.

"A couple of weeks ago we did a lot of praying as a community for her," Sis said.

The 86-year-old nun suffered a heart attack on Nov. 22 and underwent surgery for a blocked artery Nov. 29.

Tuesday, a mild electric shock corrected Mother Teresa's irregular heartbeat. CNN reported she asked to go home the same day. Her doctors say she may be able to return home by Christmas.

Military Sex Scandal
This past year, military personnel have been the target of several sexual harassment accusations. Cases have been brought up in various military bases in the United States, such as Fort Hood in Killeen and Army Ordnance Center in Aberdeen, Md.

Kenneth Webb, a junior computer engineering major in V-1, said he can see both the civilian and military sides of the issue.

"From a civilian standpoint, you can see how a lot of people begin to think this is a big problem," Webb said. "From a military point of view, for the most part ... it's a shock."

Webb said every case should be investigated, and he predicts some accusations will be true, but other cases will not be convincing.

"I think that scandals like these are going to happen," Webb said. "True or not, you have to investigate everything."
