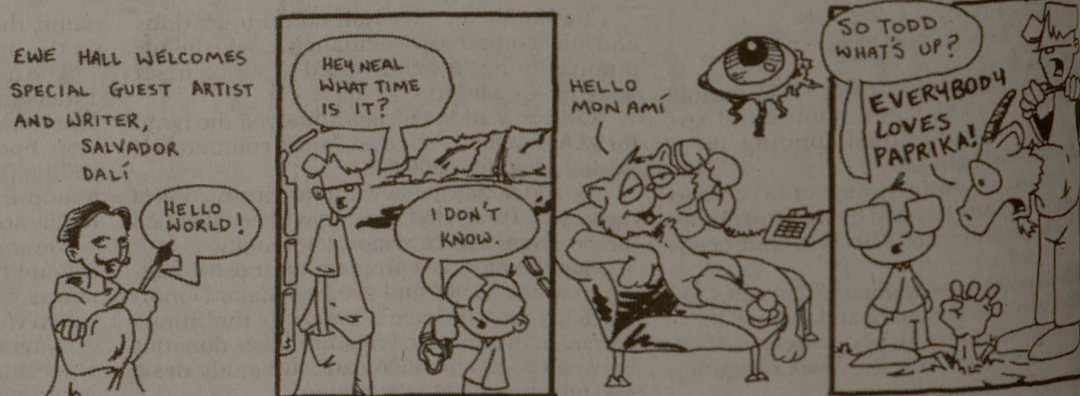

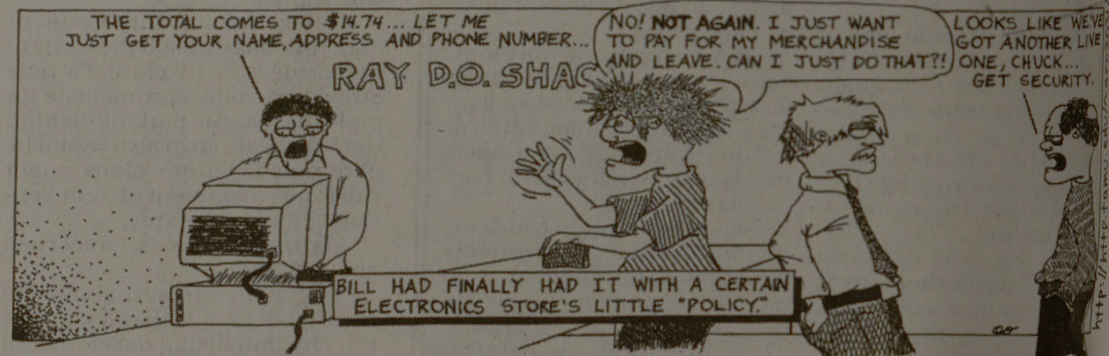

Becki Elkins-Nesheim, coordinator of women's programs for Special Student Services, said the department handles situations like this one. "That is a component of that position, to address issues of harassment and discrimination," Elkins-Nesheim said. "The yell leader incident matched that, and so Special Student Services responded to that incident."

In response, Tom addressed the concerns of those who were offended by the yell practice Thursday at a GLBA meeting. Tom apologized for the comments, and said they were not meant to be offensive. "On behalf of the yell leader, the comments at yell practice were insensitive and inexcusable," said. "I recognize that. On behalf of the yell leaders, I'm here to say I'm sorry. "I'm embarrassed by the incident. I'm embarrassed for myself. I'm embarrassed for the yell leader. We are truly, truly sorry."

Joy Plummer, director of finance for MEDALS and a senior journalism major, said as a MEDALS participant in 1993 she had the opportunity to meet new people, win a MEDALS scholarship and establish a niche at A&M. "I had something that I knew I could be a part of because I had my own Aggie family here with MEDALS," Plummer said. Plummer said some participants take the conference seriously and reconsider their decision on attending college. "Our motto is, 'If we can affect

one person out of 800, it was worth it," Plummer said. Beekmann said they get a lot of feedback about the conference and it can influence those who are most unsure about their future. "We get a lot of letters from them that indicate 'You really made a difference in my life,'" she said. Three \$1,000 scholarships are sponsored by MEDALS and its primary corporate sponsor, SBC Communications. The scholarships are based on an essay and will be presented to the winners Saturday. Plummer said student attendance at the conference increased every year. A goal on the number of students who attend might eventually have to be put into place because facilities and funds are limited, she said.
