

Emotional Routier reads from journals

KERRVILLE (AP) - A sobbing Darlie Routier affirmed her love for her sons and recounted unusual events that occurred before they were attacked as she testified Wednesday in her capital murder trial.

"I am a very proud mother of three wonderful, gorgeous, healthy boys," Mrs. Routier said, reading to the jury from her personal journal.

Wearing a light green suit and her long, blond hair in a bun, Routier appeared calm during questioning by defense attorney Doug Mulder about her childhood and her family background.

But the Rowlett homemaker became emotional when Mulder asked her to read certain journal passages and to listen to a recording of the frantic 911 call she made after her two oldest sons were stabbed to death.

Prosecutors claim she was angry over money problems and the burdens of motherhood and that she slashed herself to cover the crime.





This day in history

1997. There are 335 days left in the year.

On this date: In 1948, Indian political and spiritual leader Mahatma Gandhi was murdered by a Hindu extremist.

In 1882, the 32nd president of the United States, Franklin Delano Roosevelt, was born in Hyde Park, N.Y. In 1933, Adolf Hitler became chancellor of Germany.

In 1933, the first episode of the Lone Ranger radio program was broadcast on station WXYZ in Detroit.

In 1962, two members of the Flying Wallendas highwire act were killed when their seven-person pyramid collapsed during a performance in Detroit.

In 1968, the Tet offensive began as Communist forces launched surprise attacks against South Vietnamese provincial capitals.

In 1972, 13 Roman Catholic civil rights marchers were shot to death by British soldiers in Northern Irethrough 1994. (Congress, however, overrode the veto.)
