Routier to receive sentencing

KERRVILLE, Texas (AP) — The other pending charge covers De-err County jury that convicted von's death, but prosecutors haven't Kerr County jury that convicted homemaker Darlie Routier of capital murder begins deciding Monday whether she'll be sentenced to death or life in prison.

'We intend to forcefully argue for the death penalty," prosecutor Greg Davis said Saturday after Routier was found guilty of a capital murder charge in the June 6, 1996, stabbing deaths of her two voung sons.

Routier was accused of killing 5-year-old Damon and 6-year-old Devon Routier in a grisly knife attack at the family's home in the Dallas suburb of Rowlett, 20 miles east of Dallas.

The capital murder charge applied to the death of Damon because he was under 6 years old. Ansaid whether they will pursue it.

Prosecutors alleged Routier angry over money problems and the burdens of motherhood — killed both boys, slashed herself and staged a crime scene to fool police

After a month of testimony, a seven-woman, five man jury agreed, returning a guilty verdict after 10 hours of deliberation.

Routier, 27, was sobbing before Judge Mark Tolle read the verdict and continued crying afterward. Her family members, including husband Darin, also were weeping. "I did not kill by babies," de-

fense attorney Richard Mosty quoted Routier as saying. Defense attorneys argued Routier wouldn't have turned from a "doting mother" if "psychotic killer." They claimed she didn't have tim stage the crime scene and other suspicious people in neighborhood weren't looked seriously as suspects.

After the verdict, Routier whisked back to the Kerr Cou Jail. Her trial was moved to this! Country town about 60 m northwest of San Antonio becat bles, others of publicity in North Texas.

Rowlett Police Chief Ran Posey said Saturday his dep ment was pleased with the gu verdict, but added: "It shoul remembered that there are winners in this case.

Posey had no comment whether Routier should be tenced to die.


