Sayavedra was inducted in Who's Who Worldwide, named Distinguished Alumnus at the University of North Texas, and was chosen as one of five "Citizens of the Year" by The Laredo Morning Times in 1995.

Before he took the job as Deputy Chancellor of the A&M System, Sayavedra was president of Texas A&M International University in Laredo.

He considers overseeing the construction of the new A&M International campus one of the highlights of his career.

As deputy chancellor, Sayavedra oversees all universities and agencies in the A&M System and works closely with all A&M University presidents. He also represents the system to the Texas Higher Educa-

tion Coordinating Board and interacts with the Texas Legislature.

Being deputy chancellor is an interesting experience, Sayavedra said.

"This job is so diverse and complex, you never know what's going to happen," he said.

Terri Parker, director of communications for the A&M System, works with Sayavedra on a daily basis. "Genuine" is a word she uses to describe him.

"[Sayavedra] is a top-notch individual," Parker said. "He gives everybody the same attention and he works well with individuals at all levels."

Making friends, Parker said, is one of the deputy chancellor's priorities.

"Dr. Sayavedra is always there to lend an ear," Parker said. "He cultivates relationships not only profes-

sionally but personally as well."

"You're only as good as the people you work with," Sayavedra said. "One should never compromise his or her integrity. And, by all means, protect your dignity."

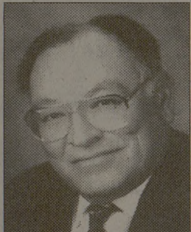
"Whenever you do something, do it to the best of your ability."

A survey of cattle producers said the Texas cattle industry loses \$67 million annually because of fire ant damage.

Frisbee said fire ants are attracted to electrical transformers.

Bobby Singletary, an engineering supervisor at Bryan utilities, said fire ants build up mounds in electrical transformers and can cause a short if the live parts are exposed.

"We've opened up the lid of a transformer and its packed completely full of ants," Singletary said. "The utility companies have to keep repairing the damage fire ants cause," Frisbee said.

Singletary said electrical short-outs from fire ant damage rarely occur though.

"They're just a pain, basically," he said.

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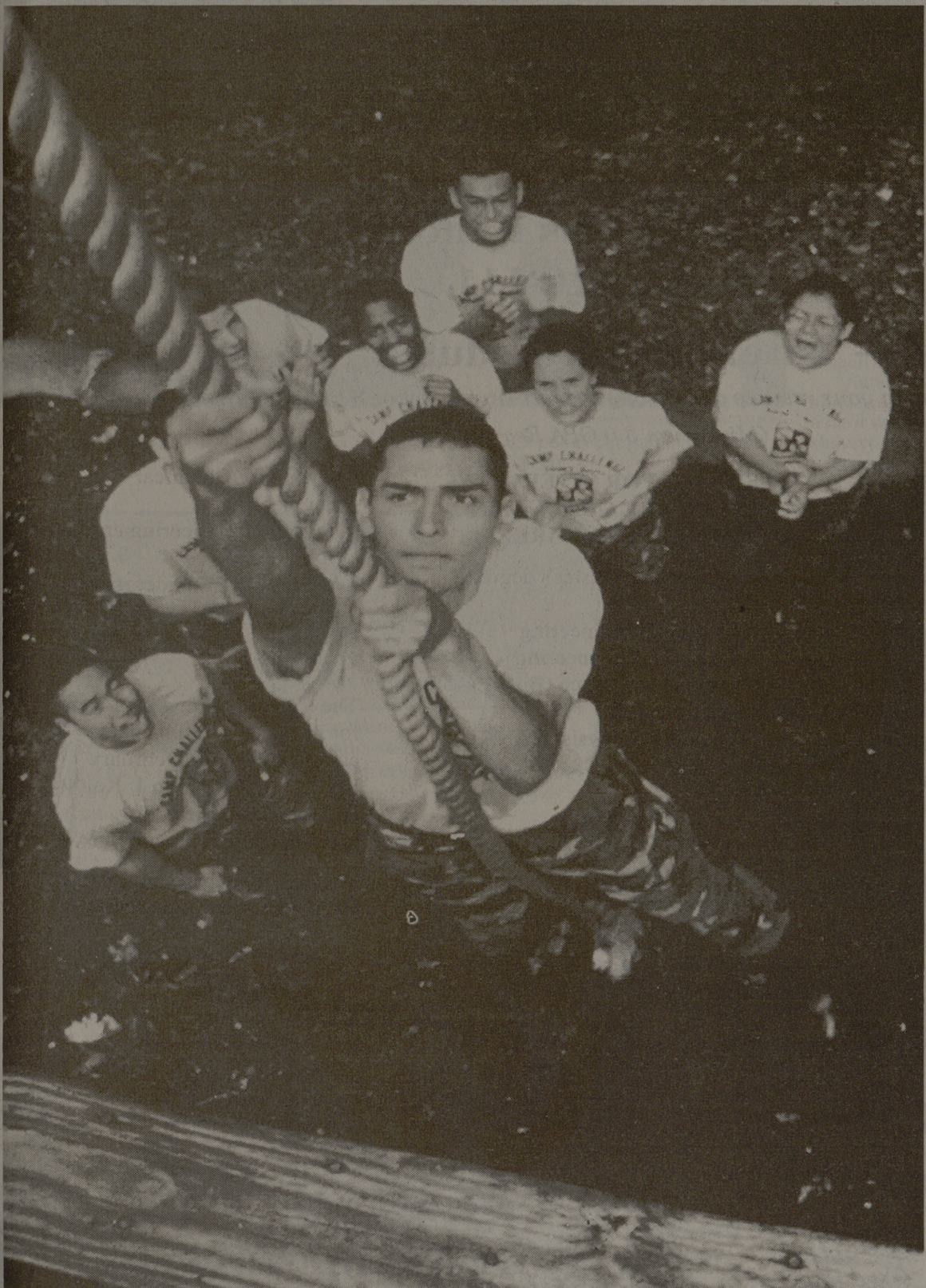
