




**Hollywood's sensitivity keeps Routier off TV**

HOUSTON (AP) — The tale of Darlie Routier, the mother sent to death row for killing one of her young sons, seems to have all the components that draw Hollywood to a crime.

So where are all the film crews this time? Hollywood insiders say studios are shying away in large part because of an increasing reluctance to portray violence against children as entertainment.

"This has become a massive no-no for television," Steve Fisher said, who sells true-crime stories to various studios for the Renaissance Literary and Talent Agency in Los Angeles.

"Even implied violence, off-screen violence—the networks are saying 'no.' They just don't want to go near that," he said.

Fisher also said the 27-year-old homemaker from suburban Dallas lacks the national notoriety of other cases. He points out that Routier received far less national attention than Susan Smith, a South Carolina mom accused of drowning her sons.

"Any other garden-variety Susan Smiths out there," Fisher said. "If they don't make it to the cover of People magazine, their story is going to be completely unsellable."

Texas crimes seem to have a knack for ending up on television, most recently the stories of two cadets accused of killing a high school girl as part of a love triangle and the cheerleading mother saga.

Other modern-day Texans featured in crime-related movies have included serial killer Henry Lee Lucas, millionaire Cullen Davis and mass-killer Charles Whitman.

Routier was sentenced to death Feb. 4 after being convicted for one capital murder in connection with the June 6, 1996, stabbings of two of her three boys.

Routier, who also was stabbed, said she and the boys were attacked by a killer who remains at large. She said she slept through the attack and awoke to see the back of a fleeing suspect.

Prosecutors argued she committed the crime and then concocted the story of an attacker.

**Houston schools see uniform popularity**

HOUSTON (AP) — School uniforms, once the signature dress of private and parochial schools, are suddenly mushrooming in popularity in Houston-area schools.

This year, 168 of 257 schools in the Houston Independent School District have uniform dress policies that range from standardized styles, like khakis and golf-styled shirts, to required outfits.

"It certainly has done a wonderful job as far as neatening up our campus," said Mary Ann Polhemus, principal at Houston's Ashford Elementary. "The kids look wonderful, the kids feel good about themselves. The fact that we are still seeing such a high compliance rate I think speaks very well for the fact that the kids like them."

Two years ago, state law gave districts the right to adopt rules requiring uniforms as long as poorer students get assistance. Parents opposed to uniforms were given the right to refuse or seek a transfer for their child as long as they had a legitimate religious or philosophical reason.

A bill recently passed by the Texas Senate would ensure parents a say in whether a public school can require uniforms.

Barbara Williams, spokesperson for the Texas Association of School Boards, said more districts in the state are considering uniforms.

School officials also say it helps identify intruders who do not belong on campus, eases the strain on family budgets and promotes an overall better campus climate.

"It eliminates the fashion distraction," said Sheila Lidstone, spokeswoman for the Galveston district, where five schools adopted the wearing of uniforms. "We're also able to track attendance better because kids in uniform can be spotted if they are trying to skip school," Lidstone said.

Polhemus said her school has adopted a policy called "uniformity with individuality."

Students are allowed a choice of red, white, yellow, green or blue polo shirts with khaki or navy blue bottoms. The girls also can wear multi-colored plaid skirts or jumpers. Other options include school T-shirts in white or blue, and a denim shirt with the school crest.

Students are not forced to comply, but between 85 percent and 90 percent of them do.
