"The imagery that the film had is a constant reminder of how easily humanity can fall," Jimenez said. "We need these reminders to remember how easily it is to slip into animal behavior so we can prevent something like this from happening again."  
Lustig is a professor of literature at American University and has written many novels on the Holocaust, including *Diamonds of the Night*, *The Street of Lost Brothers*, *The Prayer for Katarina Horovitzova*, *Children of the Holocaust*, *Night and Hope*, *Darkness Casts No Shadow*, *Darling*, *Oleander Trees* and *A Man the Size of a Postage Stamp*. His latest work, *The Unloved*, was published in English.

Haden said the helpful issues and skills she uses most were acquired when she was an A&M student.  
"Already having a sense of honesty and integrity, a willingness to be different, a feeling of camaraderie, a feeling for traditions and a fighting spirit is how being an Aggie helps," she said.  
Baughman, president and CEO of University & State Employees Credit Union, said she did all the right things until she got to college. Baughman said she thought she would be the

one who became a lawyer and never got married.  
"I realized very quickly that my big ideas were running straight into big troubles," she said. "I met a guy, dropped out [of school] and got married."  
After taking a job with a bank, Baughman ran head-on into sex discrimination.  
"I always wanted to be the CEO, and after the CEO resigned I thought I had a chance," she said. "However, I ran into that glass ceiling when the board asked me to help them find the right man for the job."  
Linda Stewart, a computer science graduate student, said she never has run into such problems.  
"Because a lot of technology

fields have an absence of women," she said. "I see of an implied unconscious feeling, rather than direct discrimination."  
Baughman stressed that she should never compromise potential or relationships for the sake of success.  
Stewart said each provided useful and practical tips for entering the workforce.  
"They had insights on how to manage college, as well as how to manage life in general," she said.  
Baughman said there was a piece of advice she would give young people.  
"Never lose touch with your roots. You have to know where you are now."
