League realignment remains a question

NEW YORK (AP) — Prospects dimmed for major league realignment at this week's meetings in Atlanta, with some baseball executives predicting Monday there will not be enough support for any plan.

Acting commissioner Bud Selig had hoped to call for a vote on Thursday, the final day of the owners' three-day quarterly meeting. Selig is in favor of radical realignment, in which 15 teams would switch leagues.

Less radical plans have been formulated, with most including the shift of the AL West Coast teams to the NL. But the San Francisco Giants have threatened to sue, arguing they can't be forced to accept the Oakland Athletics in their market.

Ranking officials on two other NL teams, speaking on the condition they not be identified, said they intended to support San Francisco.

"When you buy a team, you buy assets, which include exclusive monopoly rights to promoting games within your own league in your area on an exclusive basis," Giants owner Peter Magowan said Monday. "We would be asked to give that up. That's exactly why the Mets and Cubs resisted."

The radical plan that Selig and realignment committee chairman John Harrington have advocated would put all Western teams in the NL and all Eastern teams in the AL. It would put the Mets and Yankees in the same division, pair the Cubs and White Sox, and the Dodgers and Angels, and the Giants and A's.

Since no team can be forced to switch leagues or divisions without their approval, the Mets threatened to veto the plan, as did the Pirates, Reds and Braves. Harrington's group then formulated a less radical plan, but it still would have the six Pacific Coast teams in the NL along with the Arizona Diamondbacks and Colorado Rockies.

"Bud Selig mollified the Mets and Cubs by allowing them to stay in their separate divisions. What is the logic behind not allowing the same thing?" Magowan said from Atlanta, where the Giants were playing the Braves.

Baseball's lawyers have said the Giants do not have veto power because they are not being asked to change divisions. Some team owners have argued that the realignment approved in January, which created the realignment committee, overrides the provision in the Constitution that protects a team from having its territory encroached.

If the A's move to the NL, Magowan said they probably would return a telephone call. Baseball's realignment debate began in January, when the 15 expansion teams were assigned to leagues — Tampa Bay to the AL and Arizona to the NL.

While Arizona was a natural in the NL West, putting Tampa Bay in the AL East required shuffling. The original plan was to move Detroit from the East to the Central and Kansas City from the Central to the West, but the Royals balked, claiming they didn't want additional West Coast games that would result in late television times for fans back home.

With no realignment, Tampa Bay would be forced to play in the AL West. Also, January's meeting left each league with 15 teams necessitating an interleague game nearly every day. Plans to have teams in one league and 14 in the other appear to have gained support since January.

Fisher prepares Oilers for Ravens. NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Jeff Fisher is not the kind of guy who can sit quietly, watching other guys coach.

His Tennessee Oilers had a bye last weekend. That meant Fisher spent Sunday relaxing with his family — until he walked by a television.

"It was difficult turning the TV on and watching ball games," Fisher told reporters Monday. "That is a great motivational factor sitting at home Sunday watching the games."

The last time he experienced the feeling was December, when the Oilers finished 8-8 and missed out on the playoffs by one game.

With the Baltimore Ravens (2-1) on the schedule this Sunday in Memphis, Fisher dove back into the work week Monday. He had his players do extra work on special teams — which were shredded by Oakland and Miami — third-down situations and blitzes.

Fisher also promised plenty of tackling drills to make up for the off week.

After watching several close games during the weekend, Fisher had the Oilers (1-1) work on their two-minute drill, something they normally practice on Fridays.

"Let's face it. Games are coming down to the end, won and lost right before the half or right before the end of the game. You have to have a good idea about your two-minute drill," said Fisher, whose team has gone into overtime in both its games.

"We're going to spend more time in the two-minute game than we have in the past."

After the Oilers gave up 13 yards on kickoff returns to the Raiders and 171 yards in kickoff and punt returns to the Dolphins, Fisher announced what would do whatever necessary to fix his special teams. That meant he probably will rotate starting linebackers Lonnie Marts, Jeff Bowden and Barron Wortham onto kick coverage teams against the Ravens.

Last year, the Oilers had John Henry Mills anchoring their special teams, and he earned a trip to the Pro Bowl for his work. Now he's with the Raiders, and no one has stepped up to fill the void.

Marts said the starters hoped to show the younger players the right way to tackle kick returners, something that can't be duplicated in the slower pace of the practice field.

"That's what's hurting us right now, something simple that we can take care of, and do whatever I can," said Marts, an eight-year veteran who broke into playing special teams for Kansas City as an undrafted free agent.

The Oilers went into their bye relatively healthy. The most serious injury was to Pro Bowl safety Blaine Bishop, who has a fractured right forearm.

Fisher said Bishop's availability this weekend will depend on how much pain he feels and his mobility with a splint.

Wide receiver Derek Russell, who broke his collarbone July 29, is expected to play.

Baltimore first to clinch playoff spot. BALTIMORE (AP) — On a day that Eric Davis enjoyed an emotional return to the playing field, the Baltimore Orioles assured themselves of a trip back to the AL playoffs.

Davis went hitless in his first game since colon cancer surgery in June, but the Orioles became the first team in the majors to clinch a spot in the postseason by beating Cleveland 6-5 Monday in the opener of a day-night doubleheader.

The victory also reduced the Orioles' magic number to win the AL East title to nine. Baltimore, which ended a 13-year playoff drought last year as the wild-card

entrant, had not been to the postseason in successive years since 1973-74.

Davis, 35, received ovation from the fans at Camden Yards and his Oriole teammates. When he reached the plate in the fifth inning, the fans stood and cheered for 70 seconds as the song "We Are the Inspiration" played on the public address system.

An RBI groundout by Mike Williams against Armando Benoit (4-4) put Cleveland ahead in the seventh, but Hammonds hit the 20th homer in the bottom half of the sixth.

Randy Myers worked the ninth for his 42nd save.
