**NASA satellite to be visible Friday in BCS**

If Friday night is clear, people in Bryan and College Station will be able to see more than stars.

NASA's Near Earth Asteroid Rendezvous (NEAR) spacecraft will be visible in the night sky between 12:30 and 12:45, coming from the western sky.

Light from the sun will reflect off of NEAR's solar panels, making it visible in the dark.

The spacecraft was built by The Johns Hopkins University and is on its way to study asteroid 433 Eros.

NEAR will be within range to photograph Eros in February.

**More jurors qualified in cadet murder trial**

FORT WORTH (AP) — The judge in the murder trial of a former Naval Academy midshipman has qualified 10 more prospective jurors.

State District Judge Joe Drago is trying to pick at least 80 potential panel members who have not been swayed by widespread media attention about the Diana Zamora case, including a television docudrama and two books about a fatal love triangle.

Drago selected 10 jurors as the jury screening process continued this morning.

From groups of 50, Drago selected 32 potential jurors Tuesday and 34 more Wednesday. The judge will question another group of 50 Friday if he cannot select 18 today.

The 80 people who are chosen will be asked back next week for defense attorneys and prosecutors to make the final selections.

**Character questions raised as Clinton probe continues**

Around the country, reaction to the charges against a president often battered by questions about his character ranged from disbelief to dismay.

"I think he's losing his credibility, and it wasn't so great to begin with," said Don Wiebelhaus, a 59-year-old Detroit security guard.

Lusya Shmavonian, 28, an administrative assistant from Ridgefield, N.J., said she doesn't know whether to believe that Clinton had an affair, but added, "I think he's a good president and I don't see what that has to do with anything."

In Washington, the day's events unfolded in something of a crisis atmosphere.

"Welcome, ladies and gentlemen, to the theater of the absurd,"

White House press secretary Mike McCurry said at the outset of a daily briefing dominated by questions about the Lewinsky matter.

McCurry's predecessor, Dee Dee Myers, told NBC: "This is a situation that's completely out of control. ...It is a feeding frenzy of the first order." Even so, she said of Clinton, "If he's not telling the truth, I think the consequences are just astronomical."

The seriousness of the potential charges — adultery and encouraging perjury — reverberated among congressional leaders.

"The allegations are certainly very serious. If they should prove to be true, that's going to cause some problems legally," Republican Senate Majority Leader Trent said in Jackson, Miss.

Gerald Solomon, R-N.Y., chair of the House Rules Committee, said Republicans were waiting to see how events unfold before considering impeachment. But he said that if charges against Clinton were found to be valid, "the whole

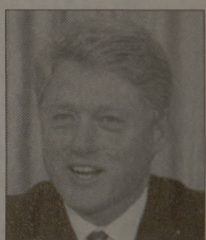
roof could blow off. I fear the country."

Beyond the revelation of Lewinsky, there was new information about Clinton's relationship with another woman.

Clinton reportedly admitted in his weekend deposition that he had an affair with Gennifer Flowers during the 1970s. The New York Post reported. Flowers claimed she had a 12-year relationship with Clinton, told AP that she believed after all this time that she now admits what he had done.

Also Thursday, an individual familiar with the Jones case, Shelia Lawrence, wife of Ambassador M. Lamarr Lawrence, had been subpoenaed to testify. Lawrence, a former president, has offered to testify she has no information about the case, the individual said.

**Kaczynski pleads guilty, receives life sentence in Unabomber case**

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Theodore Kaczynski admitted Thursday he is the anti-technology terrorist known as the Unabomber, pleading guilty in a deal with the government that will send him to prison for life.

The 55-year-old mathematics professor turned woodland hermit entered the plea in a mid-afternoon hearing, on the day a jury was to be sworn in and opening statements were to begin.

The agreement avoids the possibility of his execution. Had the jury convicted Kaczynski, he could have faced death by injection.

His motivations and that of the government were oddly aligned. Judged by a prison psychiatrist to be paranoid schizophrenic, Kaczynski did not want to be portrayed in court as a madman. Prosecutors, meanwhile, clearly did not want to be perceived as trying to execute a mentally ill man.

A senior federal official in Washington said that a report

submitted only days ago to the federal Bureau of Prisons by a psychiatrist was the decisive factor in the deal.

Dr. Sally Johnson, who testified that Kaczynski was paranoid schizophrenic, said he was marked by delusional potential for violence.

A plea bargain had been discussed for months, but Kaczynski repeatedly turned down the offer because he insisted on certain conditions.
