Chicago Cubs legend Caray dies of stroke

RANCHO MIRAGE, Calif. (AP) — Harry Caray, who took millions of fans out to the ball game on radio and television, died Wednesday, four days after collapsing at a Valentine's Day dinner. He was believed to be 77.

In a career spanning almost 60 years, the often offbeat Hall of Fame broadcaster covered baseball's greats from Musial to Mays to Maddux. Holy Cow! as he would say.

"We're going to miss old Harry," Hall of Famer Stan Musial said. "He was always the life of the party, the life of baseball."

Caray had a heart attack Saturday at a nightclub-restaurant while with his wife, Dutchie, near their winter home. He died of brain damage caused by the attack, said Harlan Corenman, Eisenhower Medical Center spokesman.

A broadcaster since 1941, Caray became a household name through his Chicago Cubs' games for WGN-TV, carried nationally by many cable systems. He was immediately recognizable for his thick, oversized glasses and raspy, sing-along rendition of "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" over the public address system during the seventh-inning stretch.

Caray was a broadcaster for the St. Louis Cardinals for 25 years and for the Chicago White Sox for 11 years before moving across town to Wrigley Field in 1982.

During his 15 years with the hapless Cubs, he was fond of spelling names backward and mentioning fans, including his favorite bartenders, who were visiting the ballpark.

Happy Birthday to So-and-

So... Happy Anniversary and-So. That's always been the way of acknowledging the way he wrote in his 1989 autobiography, *Holy Cow*.

Another favorite Caray phrase was "It might be a home run, but it's a home run!" "Cubs win! Cubs win!" after each Chicago victory. He said he developed the phrases during a seminar on ball tooting given by Mike Barr.

Caray could be heard on the radio to the "W Game" that could work. First title.

Hillary Rodham Clinton, long Cubs fan. "And I hope doing a seventh-inning stretch in heaven."

Jack Buck, also a member announcer's wing of the Fame, remembered auditioning for the job he got with Cardinals in 1953.

"They sent me a tape and said, 'We want you to be him,'" Buck said. "And I hope no way I could do that. Only one guy who could be cast like him."

Added longtime announcer Vin Scully, "I could be critical, content and bombastic, or I could be lovable and full of praise. People in the bleachers, as the man in the box seat, they shared their love of ball with a true fan."

Vikings' Randle makes NFL history with deal

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — With NFL teams throwing around their newfound TV billions like so much Monopoly money, John Randle might not reign long as the highest-paid defensive player in league history.

NFL Defensive Player of the Year Dana Stubblefield of San Francisco could oust Randle soon. Stubblefield's agent said he's working on a contract that will be the blockbuster of an offseason filled with blockbuster deals.

One thing is certain about Randle, the Minnesota Vikings' one-of-a-kind defensive tackle who agreed to a \$32.5 million, five-year contract: No one can match the unique blend of power, speed, desire and humility that has made Randle one of the best pass rushers ever.

"There aren't too many John Randles," Vikings vice president Jeff Diamond said Tuesday. "If there's any guy I'm not worried about performing and playing with the intensity he's displayed, it's John Randle."

The NFL's sack leader since 1991 with 84 1/2, Randle cashed in on his steady dominance and the league's mammoth TV contract Tuesday, agreeing to the record deal, which includes a \$10 million signing bonus.

The yearly average of \$6.5 million blows away the \$4.7 million average of Buffalo defensive end Bruce Smith, and the total value of Randle's package eclipses the \$29.75 million Kansas City gave to linebacker Derrick Thomas in a seven-year deal last year.

Randle's agent, Gary Uberstine, said only quarterbacks Steve Young of San Francisco (\$49.2 million, an \$8.2 million average) and Brett Favre of Green Bay (\$47.3 million, \$6.75 million average) will earn more per season on average than Randle.

"We feel terrific that we were able to eclipse that age-old barrier between quarterbacks and the truly marquee players at impact positions," Uberstine said. "We've never felt that it was appropriate that quarterbacks should make more than players like John Randle just because they're quarterbacks."

An undrafted free agent who signed with the Vikings from Texas A&I in 1990, Randle led the NFL with a career-best 15 1/2 sacks in 1997 and earned All-Pro honors for the third straight sea-

son. He also broke Alan Page's team record for defensive men with his fifth consecutive Pro Bowl start.

Since free agency Friday, Randle twice turned offers believed to be in the million range from the Vikings. The Miami Dolphins were one of four teams that had made contract proposals, and Randle went to Miami on Monday.

He headed home to Tuesday after the Vikings upped their offer. Never a fan of talking about his contract, Randle was unavailable for comment Tuesday.

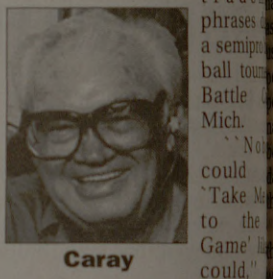
The contract spoke for itself. "Clearly we could not have as a football team if we had the caliber of John Randle," said Diamond, who worked out the deal amid a flurry of other negotiations. "Really had to do whatever we could make sure the deal got done."

Also Tuesday, the Vikings entertained cornerback Ed Evans of Green Bay, their top priority among other team agents. The Vikings badly want Evans to help repair their defense, which was among NFL's worst last season.

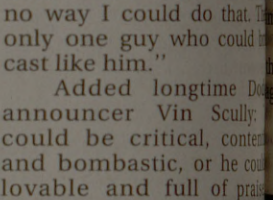
"I think it's going to be a call," Diamond said. Expected to command a \$4 million a season, Evans scheduled to visit Baltimore Jacksonville. Diamond said Evans could make a decision soon in the next day or two.

A Vikings fan since his childhood in Shreveport, La., Evans already knows Vikings history. "Being in Louisiana is a kind of neat," Evans said. "I knew all the guys: (coach) Grant to Ahmad Rashad and Tarkenton, Chuck Foreman, Chuck Foreman was one of our favorite players."

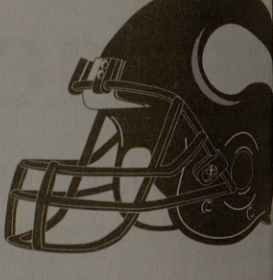
Minnesota also auditioned four kickers Tuesday, Chris and Chip Lohmiller most prominent among them.
