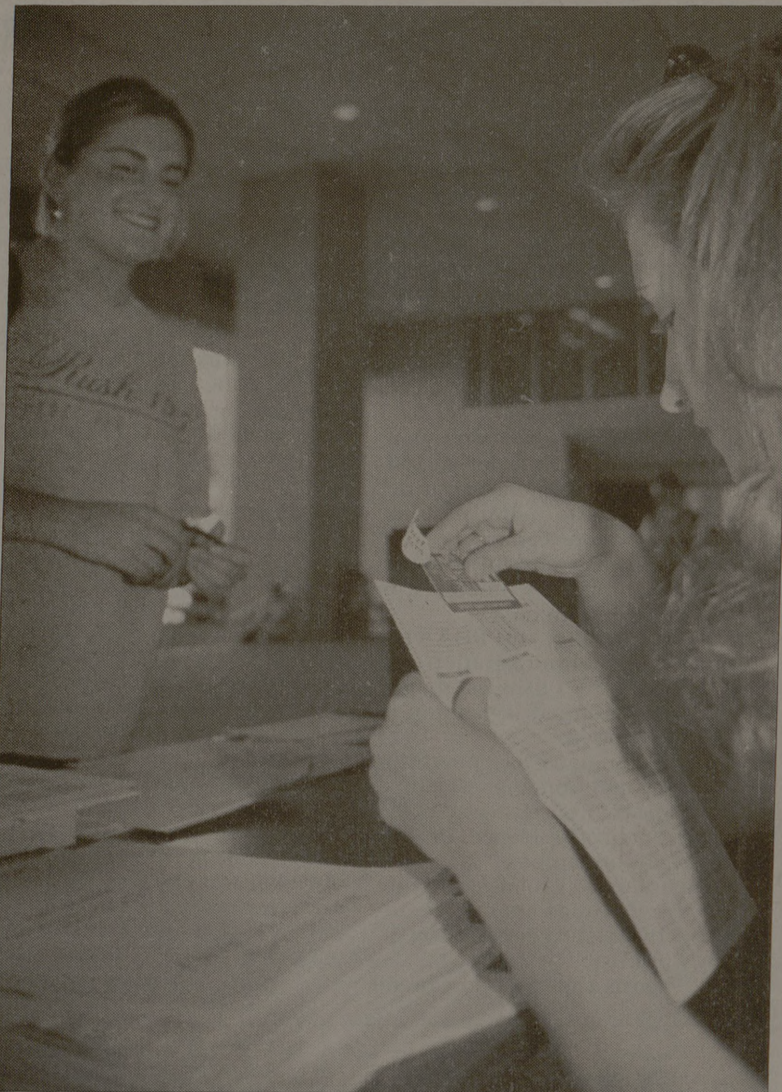


Rock the vote

The program has expanded since it started about 16 years ago.

Jennifer Box, a Big Event co-chair of expansion and development and a junior journalism major, said Big Event has drawn

as many as 5,000 student workers to complete 500 jobs in the community.

"We haven't turned down a job yet that we can't do," Box said.

Box said Big Event provides students an opportunity to participate in a number of service jobs for people in the Bryan-College Station community.

"We do lots of painting and yard work and all different kinds of jobs," Box said. "Overall, the project improves the quality of life for beneficiaries of the project."

Students will complete assignments with groups by organization or groups with other individuals. Each assignment usually takes between three and five hours.

"It gives them a jump start in their job in the oil industry, if that's the way they choose to go, because everyone in the industry is using work stations now," he said.

Watkins said the software will also allow his students to perform tasks in class that once required several hours or even days to complete.

"The analysis of this data has traditionally required vast amounts of paper," he said.

Fuping Zhu, a graduate geophysics student, has learned using the new software.

Zhu said the software is a PC version of

seismic interpretation that would usually be done on super-computer work stations in the work place.

"The software absolutely benefits us and lets us get a good feeling of the techniques needed for the future," she said.

She said the software has helped teach her things she could not have learned otherwise.

"You cannot learn computer skills from a textbook," she said.

Lance said the decision to donate the software was due to a working relationship between Watkins and Seismic Micro-Technology, and because of Watkins' knowledge of the software and his status at A&M.

"The co-ed halls have a much higher demand for the co-ed residence halls."

Within each residence hall, at least 50 residents must support an extension of 24 hours.

RHA introduced two additional bills reading at last night's meeting.

Michael Haughey, the vice president of upperclassmen, said, "The demand is for the co-ed residence halls."

RHA considered a constitutional amendment proposal to reduce the number of members of the RHA Judicial Board to four members of the general assembly.

Angie Fischer, RHA director of environmental affairs and a junior agriculture major, sponsored a bill because she said it is difficult to assemble nine members of the Judicial Board.

RHA was not able to vote on any legislation because the general assembly lacked a quorum.

The Department of Residence Life announced the general assembly that tentative plans for conditioning to Walton Hall and add women's Hall will not be implemented during the fall semester.

Ron Sasse, the director of the Department of Residence Life, said the department continues both options.
