USA starter Casey Fossum (1-, a Texas A&M sophomore leftanded pitcher, gave up nine hits ver seven innings to notch his rst victory of the season.

He struck out nine and issued one alk in his first outing of the summer f 1998. Fossum only allowed one ared run in the fifth inning.

The Americans jumped out to nearly 2-0 lead in the first inning, lead they would never relinish. After the one Mexico run in a fifth, the USA team countered ith one in the sixth to recapture two-run advantage.

Ryan Ludwick, a sophomore thielder from UNLV, led off the venth with a solo home run to left led, his first one of the season. The mericans added one run in the venth and two more in the eighth put the game out of reach.

USA reliever Shane Wright, a xas Tech junior, gave up one run in eninth to make the final score 7-2.

Recruit receives diploma from Trinity Valley High, will play for Big 12 Champion Texas A&M in fall

Texas A&M soccer coach G. Guerrieri announced Tuesday that Amber Childers will graduate from Trinity Valley High School in Arlington a year early to play

for the Aggies this fall.
Childers led Trinity Valley to the 1997 Southwest Preparatory Conference State Championship and guided the Texas Image '81 club team to the Under-17 State Championship.

Texas A&M will play season preview matches at the Aggie Soccer Complex against Oregon on August 27 and a former students team on August 29 before opening the 1998 regular season with a home match against North Texas on September 1.

Rockets trade Kevin Willis; Raptors part with Rogers, first-round picks

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston Rockets forward Kevin Willis, almost traded to Toronto last February, finally became a Raptor in a trade for forward Roy Rogers and the 16th and 18th picks in the June 24 draft, the teams announced Tuesday.

"This was a great opportunity for us because we had the ability to get two No. 1 picks and a former No. 1 pick in Roy Rogers," Rockets coach Rudy Tomjanovich said. "However, our appreciation for Kevin Willis made this decision very difficult because of everything he has done for the Houston Rockets and the entire city of Houston."

Willis was one of the Rockets' steadiest performers last season. He started 74 regular season games and averaged 16.1 points and 8.4 rebounds. He is scheduled to earn \$2.1 million this season.

Willis was involved in a regular-season trade with the Raptors in February that would have sent guard Damon Stoudamire to the Rockets. That deal fell apart and Stoudamire eventually was traded to Portland.

"Kevin is flattered that Toronto would trade two first round picks and a third player for him to play in Toronto," said Steve Woods, Willis' agent. "Last February, it was a bargaining manipulation whereas today it is based on Toronto wanting to bring in a seasoned pro and an outstanding basketball player."



Toronto obtained the 18th pick from Portland deal. The 16th pick originally belonged to New

Rogers has played for Vancouver, Boston and Toronto in his two NBA seasons. The 6-foot-10, 235-pound

Rogers has averaged 5.8 points, 4.2 rebounds and 1.8 blocked shots in 97 professional games.

The Rockets won back-to-back NBA championships in 1994 and 1995 but they have failed to return to the title game since Utah eliminated them from the first round of the playoffs this spring.

The average age of the Rockets' playoff roster this season was 32.6, leaving the Rockets with a goal of getting younger for next season. They already owned the 14th pick.

Charles Jones, 41, and Clyde Drexler, 35, already have announced their retirement and trading Willis sent another 35-year old packing.

The Rockets still have two of their superstars, Hakeem Olajuwon and Charles Barkley, both 35.
